March In the United Kingdom a coroner is an independent judicial office holder, appointed and paid for by the relevant local authority. The Ministry of Justice , which is headed by the Lord Chancellor and Secretary of State for Justice has the responsibility for the coronial law and policy only, and no operational responsibility. A different system applies in Scotland , which does not have a coroner service. He provides advice, guidance and training to coroners and aims to secure uniformity of practice throughout England and Wales. The post is currently part-time. He has also been appointed a deputy judge of the High Court, and as such he normally sits as a member of the bench when that court has occasion to hold a judicial review of an inquest. England and Wales are divided into coroner districts by the Lord Chancellor, each district consisting of the area or areas of one or more local authorities. The relevant local authority, with the consent of the Chief Coroner and the Lord Chancellor, must appoint a Senior Coroner for the district. It must also appoint Area Coroners in effect deputies to the Senior Coroner and Assistant Coroners, to the number that the Lord Chancellor considers necessary in view of the physical character and population of the district. The cost of the coroner service for the district falls upon the local authority or authorities concerned, and thus ultimately upon the local inhabitants. Jurisdiction[edit] The majority of deaths are not investigated by the coroner. If the deceased has been under medical care, or has been seen by a doctor within 14 days of death, then the doctor can issue a death certificate. However if the deceased died without being seen by a doctor, or if they are unwilling to make a determination, the coroner will investigate the cause and manner of death. The coroner will also investigate when a death is deemed violent or unnatural, where the cause is unknown, where a death is the result of poisoning or industrial injury, or if it occurred in police custody or prison. Any person aware of a dead body lying in the district of a coroner has a duty to report it to the coroner; failure to do so is an offence. This can include bodies brought into England or Wales. When a person dies in the custody of the legal authorities in police cells, or in prison , an inquest must be held. In England, inquests are usually heard without a jury unless the coroner wants one. However, a case in which a person has died under the control of central authority must have a jury, as a check on the possible abuse of governmental power. Those found lying are guilty of perjury. Additional powers of

the coroner may include the power of subpoena and attachment , the power of arrest , the power to administer oaths , and sequester juries of six during inquests. Coroners also have a role in treasure trove cases. This role arose from the ancient duty of the coroner as a protector of the property of the Crown. It is now contained in the Treasure Act This jurisdiction is no longer exercised by local coroners, but by specialist "Coroners for Treasure" appointed by the Chief Coroner. Until a qualified medical practitioner could be appointed, but that is no longer possible. Any medical coroner still in office will either have been appointed before , or, exceptionally, will hold both medical and legal qualifications. Formerly, every justice of the High Court was, ex officio, a coroner for every district in England and Wales. This is no longer so; there are now no ex officio coroners. A senior judge is sometimes appointed ad hoc as a deputy coroner to undertake a high-profile inquest, such as those into the deaths of Diana, Princess of Wales and the victims of the London bombings. When the death is suspected to have been either sudden with unknown cause, violent, or unnatural, the coroner decides whether to hold a post-mortem examination and, if necessary, an inquest. The coroner commonly tells the jury which verdicts are lawfully available in a particular case. The most common verdicts include:

He or she assists other doctors and medical professionals in conducting forensic investigations. The job entails quite a bit of scientific and medical knowledge, as well as the ability to quickly draw accurate conclusions based on often scant evidence. The specific medical examiner assistant job description varies depending on the employer and the job context. Most work for cities, municipalities, or other government entities, investigating homicides and other suspicious deaths in conjunction with police. Others work for private investigation firms or insurance companies. Medical examiner assistants can also be called pathology assistants or coroner assistants. They are medical doctors or medical students who work directly under a forensic doctor, and generally play a hands-on role in all aspects of the medico-legal investigation. This often includes dissections, autopsy analysis, and wound and scar inspection. In most cases, these doctors perform complete post-death medical exams, as well. Ad No matter where a medical examiner assistant works, there are three core job responsibilities that are bound to come into play on a daily basis: Assistants work alongside lead pathologists to conduct forensic examinations. Most of the time, these examinations take place as part of a crime investigation. Many pathologists and their assistants work on an on-call basis, often traveling directly to the scene of a crime in order to view evidence directly before removing bodies and bodily remains to a laboratory for autopsy and further testing. An assistant is often responsible for writing up research and preparing reports for police. In many cases, these reports will be used in the course of legal trial. Assistants must usually receive special training in evidence collection and reporting to comply with governing court rules. Different jurisdictions have different requirements for what it takes to become a medical examiner assistant, but a medical degree " or at least significant work towards completion of such a degree " is almost always essential. Autopsies, criminal assault investigations, and other death-time bodily analysis must usually be undertaken only by persons qualified to practice medicine. Pathologists and coroners are almost always medical doctors, and, in most places, their assistants must be, too. Legal knowledge and experience with law enforcement is usually also required. Many doctors who are interested in specializing in forensics take positions as medical examiner assistants to get a feel for what the job of a full-time forensic specialist would entail. In some places, medical students or recent graduates can intern under a pathologist , while, in other places, assistants must be fully-qualified doctors, preferably with specialty work in pathology already completed. Assistants are often promoted to lead or chief medical examiner, and the experience also parlays well into a host of other investigative jobs, whether with hospitals, the police, or private investigative firms.

There are strict requirements in almost every state that involve the presence of a pathologist when the medical assistant is working. Although the pathologist conducts all of the autopsies, the pathologist assistant does help in certain key ways. One way that an assistant is often utilized is in dealing with the family and law enforcement. The medical examiner prepares the report that states what the cause of death is and the assistant is then responsible for speaking with the family as well as law enforcement if the death was labeled suspicious. For this reason a person must be compassionate when they want to pursue this as a career choice. Death is difficult for many people and explaining the cause of death to a distraught love one can be challenging. The medical examiner assistant will likely also need to be present during on-site examinations. This is one of the reasons that a pathology assistant must be comfortable dealing with deceased individuals and must also be prepared for just about any scenario involving death. This is often left to the medical examiner assistant to take care of and they document any findings for review by the pathologist. During the actual autopsy they may also need to participate by collecting samples and specimens that will be later reviewed under a microscope or sent to a laboratory for further testing. Therefore they must be well-versed in proper collection techniques including labeling the samples.

They also communicate with surviving family members, sign death certificates and store bodies until they are identified. To become an assistant coroner you need a similar background and training as a head coroner. However assistants generally have less experience and education. Start preparing to be an assistant coroner while still in high school. Take lab science classes such as biology, physics, chemistry and anatomy. Volunteer at a hospital, medical clinic or blood drive to gain experience in the medical profession. Decide what postsecondary education path you want to follow to become a coroner. According to Education Portal, coroners typically have backgrounds in medicine, criminal justice or both. The medicine educational path is the longest and requires a medical degree and residency. Obtain an undergraduate degree in forensic science, criminal justice, biology or a related field. Take the required classes for medical school, law school or another graduate program you wish to attend. Take classes related to the career in areas such as biology, anatomy, forensic science, crime scene investigation, law, criminology and psychology. Obtain a graduate degree, depending on what your long-term goals are. Attend medical school if you plan to become a coroner with a medicine background. This may take a few weeks to several months to complete. Learn by observing more experienced members of the team. Obtain additional licenses and certificates as necessary. These credentials usually require you to pass an exam and take continuing education classes to maintain active status.
