When he insisted upon unqualified acceptance of the act as a test of party loyalty, many of his friends bolted or became disaffected: Palmer, and even his faithful lieutenant, [John A. Douglas meanwhile placed John Calhoun, a longtime Illinois ally who had once hired Mr. Lincoln as a deputy surveyor, into Kansas territorial politics. At first, Calhoun acted as a moderating influence. Originally an unofficial agent of Douglas instructed to work for a compromise, Calhoun betrayed his chief to promote his own financial interests. To its wishes he yielded, and in turn this clique bent the President at will. But more important that, Calhoun had been instrumental in splitting the Democratic party into Northern and Southern wings. Lincoln had his own transplanted Illinois problem in Kansas, Mark Delahay, but Delahay was never in a political position to do so much mischief as Calhoun. Lincoln also lost old-line Whig friends, whom the Republican Party in central Illinois desperately needed to attract. So did James H. Matheny, an attorney with whom Mr. Lincoln had also been associated in politics, converted to Know-Nothings. Linder also moved to the Douglas side of Illinois politics. Even Joseph Gillespie expressed his annoyance with Republican factionalism: I am out of all temper with, and have no faith in the honesty of, men who insist that ten Whigs shall go with one Democrat because they cannot in conscience vote for a Whig. Though I am well satisfied with Trumbull, yet his five particular friends who would rather see the country go to the Devil than to vote for a Whig are not at all to my taste. I have made up my mind that henceforth I can be as reckless as they are, and, so help me God, they shall find out that I am one as well as either of them. It brought Matheny back as well. Lincoln himself declined to be a candidate for Governor in â€” realizing his friends could better work to coalesce behind William Bissell. If you place my name at the head of the ticket the Trumbulls, Cooks, Judds, and Palmers and their following will say it is nothing but the revival of the old Whig Party, and they will continue to vote as heretofore, but if you nominate an anti-slavery extension Democrats like Colonel W. Lincoln did briefly become a candidate for one post in John Palmer, as an old line Democrat, said Mr. Lincoln would add 10, votes for the Republicans in Illinois. 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Due to technical snafus, the first few minutes of the recording were lost. I was just out in Pennsylvania with the ReFormers Caucus. And we were standing in Constitution Hall, where a number of Quakers were there helping sign the Declaration of Independence. On a personal note, I felt drawn to do this basically because of the baseball game last June. Briefly, somebody approached the practice field two days before the Congressional baseball game out in D. And this man pulled out a weapon and opened fire. And to me, it was less about getting into politics and more about the realization that right now, in this moment, in this time, we need more independents. We need more people who will breach the divide, the tribalism, in America and cross that path. It was not part of the agenda. It was not step one. But it was something I felt I needed to do. What do you think of running as an independent? And what do you think of running right now in this moment? And back then, it was partisan. But particularly, as the Quaker background, particularly Quakers. So thank you for having us today. Appreciate having you here. Darlene, can you tell us your story of how you were called to run? I wanted to say thank you for having me here today and for hosting this forum. Can you see me OK? I see you fine. And I hear you perfectly well. And what I felt mostly was a certain sense of loss of the hard work that many people, specifically many civil rights leaders, have fought for. And I just want to say what an honor it is to be here. And thank you for organizing this. And I read *Earth in the Balance*, and was inspired by it, and initially wanted to go to Washington to work for Senator Gore. And one thing led to another. And stewardship obviously is the spiritual base that that comes from. Steve Bacher, thank you. And I had not been involved in politics before that. After that, I got involved. And so I got involved. I started making phone calls. I started lying down on sidewalks. The healthcare was extremely important to me and my family. And so we got involved. I just—the problem I had was that our current incumbent representative has been ignoring people here for so long and has been lying to people about what is good for them for so long that the people in this area are worse off than they were eight years ago. And I feel like working people need representation in Washington. And I ran in , and I missed the nomination by votes. So there are , people in the district. For some, their only connection with the word is the image on the Quaker Oats box. So I would ask you how much do—are you upfront about your Quakerism? Do you educate people about Quakerism? Or what kinds of sort of daily

ignorance about Quakerism do you run into that you feel like you must overcome in order to be a successful candidate? I actually ran into that not too long ago. And someone confused us with the Amish. So I had to clear that up really quickly. But the LDS community really embraced the Quaker community, especially for their work with nuclear proliferation and the nonviolent work as well. But we have a good relationship. Shawna Roberts, how have you run into this? I did have somebody who was concerned about meeting me at a bar. They suggested that I meet them at a bar. And I showed up. And then they realized I was a Quaker, and they were concerned. You must obviously hang out with them. You must know them. So it has been something that I have used Bible verses occasionally. And there are people who are a little hesitant about that because, as you know, religion can be used as a bludgeon. And so sometimes people are hesitant about that. I want them to have equality and justice. Steve Bacher, how have you run across this? And Newtown was founded by William Penn. And so people are very familiar with Quakers. A lot of progressives send their kids to Quaker school here and have friends that go to meeting. So I meet people sometimes also that used to be my middle schoolers. Or people just know I used to do it and that I went to Haverford College, which is another formerly Quaker school. And so people have a very good perception of Quakers here, especially because they really like the college. I do feel the standard Quaker line. But it also, I think, helps me. My district in Delaware County is very Catholic. And most of the Democrats running are secular.
