Martin Luther King Jr. Angelou and her teenage son Guy have moved into a houseboat commune in Sausalito, California. The transition is difficult for Guy, and Angelou is forced to protect him from a gang leader. No longer satisfied with performing in nightclubs, she dedicates herself to acting, writing, political organizing, and her son. She meets other important African-American artists and writers, including James Baldwin, who would become her mentor. She becomes a published writer for the first time. Angelou becomes more politically active and participates in African-American and African protest rallies, including helping to organize a sit-in at the United Nations following the execution of Patrice Lumumba, the ousted prime minister of the Democratic Republic of the Congo. She meets Malcolm X and is struck by his good looks and magnetism. After hearing Martin Luther King Jr. She learns that Make is too friendly with other women and is irresponsible with money, so she accepts a position as assistant editor at the *Arab Observer*. Their relationship is examined by their community of friends, and Angelou and Make eventually separate. Angelou accepts a job in Liberia, and she and Guy travel to Accra, where he has been accepted to attend college. Guy is seriously injured in an automobile accident, so she begins working at the University of Ghana and remains there while he recuperates. Starting with *I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings*, Angelou challenges the usual structure of the autobiography by critiquing, changing, and expanding the genre. Cudjoe writes that Angelou is representative of the convention in African-American autobiography as a public gesture that speaks for an entire group of people. Hagen places Angelou in the tradition of African-American autobiography, but insists that she has created a unique interpretation of the autobiographical form. Angelou has become a serial autobiographer, something Lupton calls "a narrative structure unsurpassed in American autobiography". Angelou does not begin to create her own narrative until *The Heart of a Woman*, [36] which depends less upon the conventions of fiction than her previous books. For example, there is less dialog and fewer dramatic episodes. Two of her most developed vignettes in this book are of Billie Holiday and Malcolm X. Hagen writes that although "frank talk seemed to be almost requisite for a commercially successful book" in the early s, [38] Angelou values monogamy, fidelity, and commitment in her relationships. She establishes the routines, coordinates the schedules, kisses the owies, is the calm in the storm â€” sometimes she is the storm â€” and through it all, she loves. To take us behind the faces and the titles, we sat down with seven different moms, each representing a unique mothering story. In total it has taken 12 years to get there. Having been through so much in getting here, Robin reflects that she tries to appreciate every day that she has with her daughter. Kim Meier began her mothering story on a move from Ireland to Billings when she was 8 months pregnant with their first. Their youngest is now 7. Kim fondly recalls wrapping their daughter in her swaddle while she napped under the desk as they built their business. From there the couple was able to alternate their schedules so that one of them was always with their girls. Though the family has never had to utilize childcare, Kim says balancing it all has been challenging, yet rewarding. She remembers when the girls were little how she and her husband would swap shifts at lunch hour and hand off the kids, with zero downtime. Communication and having a solid partner. Blended Family Amber Brocklebank hit the ground running into motherhood. Next came another son, now age 5, then twins a boy and a girl completed their family two years later. To blend, Amber shares, is a lot of work. Some of the challenges, she says, are just working to keep things as equal and stable as possible. First and foremost, consistency. Not only do they provide childcare, but during her pregnancy Jasmine completed classes ahead of time that covered everything from labor and delivery to learning parenting skills. The priority is her children and being supportive and dependable. That there are consequences for whatever actions they have. I want to teach them to be compassionate, loving, and tenderhearted. I have to be strong and supportive. The number specifics might not match, but the even number surely does, with six kids, ages 13, 11, 9, 5, 3, 2. Keep it simple, and find a good online calendar that tracks everything. Motherhood may not be easy, but perhaps it would be a little more so if we looked beyond appearances and dug deeper, or simply extended a little grace.
