

The history of the New York Yankees Major League Baseball (MLB) team spans more than a century. Frank J. Farrell and William Stephen Devery bought the rights to an American League (AL) club in New York City after the season.

At the end of the baseball season, the Western League was positioned by its president, Ban Johnson, as a new major league that would compete with the established National League NL. The league was reorganized and renamed the American League AL, and eight cities fielded teams in the season. A Baltimore team had played in the NL through the season, after which the club was shut down by the league. Baltimore was one of three former NL cities where the AL placed teams in an effort to reach underserved fans. McGraw left the Orioles and joined the New York Giants as their manager; he transferred his interest in the Baltimore team to the Giants as part of the deal. The league managed to take back control of the team from the Giants; after the Orioles forfeited a game because they lacked enough active players, [6] Johnson ordered that the team be "restocked with players essentially given away by the other teams in order to play out the schedule", according to author Marty Appel. His intention was for the team to play in Manhattan, but the idea was opposed by Giants owner John T. They blocked several potential stadium locations, before a pair of Tammany Hall politicians, Frank J. It is not clear whether Farrell and Devery purchased the remains of the Orioles and moved them to New York, or if they received an expansion franchise. Early years[edit] The ballpark for the New York team was constructed between th and th Streets, on Broadway in Manhattan. Formally known as American League Park, it was nicknamed Hilltop Park because of its relatively high elevation. On April 22, , the Highlanders began their season with a 3â€”1 loss to the Washington Senators; eight days later, they won their first game in Hilltop Park, defeating the Senators 6â€”2. New York fell out of contention for the AL pennant in May, falling to seventh place after playing games away from Hilltop Park for a day period while construction on the stadium concluded. With a final record of 72â€”62 after wins in 19 of 29 games played in September, New York finished in fourth. Boston and New York faced each other in a season-ending five-game series that decided the pennant winner, and was played from October 7â€” Boston won two of the first three games, which meant that New York needed to win the two contests scheduled on October 10 to win the AL title. With the score of the first game tied 2â€”2 in the ninth inning, Chesbro threw a wild pitch that allowed a runner on third base to score, giving Boston a 3â€”2 victory that clinched the AL pennant; New York won the now-meaningless second game. After losing 18 of 25 games in May, the Highlanders ended the season in sixth. With 13 games left, the team held a one-game lead over the White Sox, but finished in second place three games behind Chicago. Manager George Stallings and first baseman Hal Chase, the team captain, clashed towards the end of the season; facing opposition from Ban Johnson, who wanted him to resign as manager, Stallings left the position. The ownership group of Farrell and Devery spent their money on personal pursuits such as gambling, leaving them with little to put into the team. Author Jim Reisler dubbed him "the most crooked player to ever play the game" because of reports that he took part in game fixing. New ownership and acquisition of Babe Ruth[edit] Babe Ruth in , the year he joined the Yankees New York started playing home games at the Polo Grounds in as tenants of the Giants. Either "Yankees" or "Yanks" had been used frequently since in newspapers such as the New York Evening Journal, since "Highlanders" was hard to fit in headlines. New York had 95 wins, the most in team history to that point, but fell three wins short of the AL championship and finished third. By 1913, the teams no longer shared the Polo Grounds, as Giants owner Charles Stoneham had attempted to evict the Yankees in 1912. In 1913, the team bought a plot of land in the Bronx, and the construction crew finished the new ballpark before the season. Ruth himself had a resurgence after receiving vocal criticism for his World Series performance. He shared the MLB lead with Cy Williams by hitting 41 home runs in the season, and had a career-best. By 1915, New York had fallen to seventh place. With a three-game final margin over the Indians, the Yankees won the pennant and a spot in the World Series against the St. Louis Cardinals. Ruth hit three home runs in the fourth game, but made the final out of the Series on a failed stolen base attempt. The team led in the standings throughout. The Athletics chased them for the AL pennant towards the end of the season, but New York won the title again and faced the Cardinals in the World Series, sweeping them in four games. In the World Series, the Cardinals gave the Yankees their first Series loss since 1918, after winning in eight consecutive appearances. With the war over and the return of players from overseas, the Yankees set an MLB single-season home attendance record by attracting 2.2 million fans in 1945. McCarthy resigned as manager early in the season. The Yankees used two other managers during the year Bill Dickey and Johnny Neun, and ended in third place. Stengel hire and five straight World Series wins[edit] Despite contending late into the season, the Yankees finished in third place. Harris was released and the Yankees brought in Casey Stengel to manage. Late in the season, the Yankees broke a tie with the Tigers for first place and went on to win the pennant. Fan interest in attending games had begun declining throughout MLB in the 1930s, and the Yankees faced a drop-off in their crowds after 1945, when they sold about 2 million tickets. Pitcher Allie Reynolds threw two no-hitters during 1951, as the Yankees claimed the AL pennant for the third straight year. They then won the World Series against the Giants, four games to two. In another Yankees-Dodgers matchup, New York fell behind three games to two, but victories in games six and seven gave the Yankees the title. Continued success[edit] By 1960, the Yankees had won 15 of the last 21 AL pennants. The turning point of the season came as the Yankees faced their archrival Boston Red Sox in a five-game series in mid-August. Going into the postseason, the Yankees were picked by many prognosticators as the team to beat. The Yankees prevailed in game 1 in by a score of , but then went on an offensive drought the rest of the series that included 21 consecutive innings without scoring a run. The Tigers won the next three games of the best-in-five series to advance to the League Championship Series against the Oakland Athletics. Injuries took their toll on their pitching staff, forcing the Yankees to use 14 different starting pitchers. The Yankees overcame the sluggish start and battled back with the best record in the majors at since May Rodriguez led the Major Leagues in home runs 54 , RBIs , runs scored and slugging percentage. Yankees manager Bucky Harris won the Series for the first time since managing the Washington Senators to their only title in World Series â€” The World Series matched the New York Yankees â€”53 against the Cincinnati Reds 93â€”61 , with the Yankees winning in five games to earn their 19th championship in 39 seasons. Mantle finished with 54 while Maris set the record of 61 on the last day of the season. With all the attention surrounding the home run race, the World Series proved almost anti-climactic. World Series â€” The World Series was a rematch of the Series, with the New York Yankees beating the defending champion Milwaukee Braves in seven games for their 18th title, and their seventh in 10 years. With that victory, the Yankees became only the second team in Major League Baseball history to come

back from a 3-1 deficit to win a best-of-seven World Series; the first was the Pittsburgh Pirates. The Boston Red Sox came back from a 3-1 deficit in a best-of-nine affair. Both teams would meet again in the fall classic thirty-eight years later by that time, the Braves had moved to Atlanta. The Series was a rematch of the World Series. Steinbrenner Ownership The Yankees had been struggling during their years under CBS ownership, which had acquired the team in 1964. Paley told team president E. Michael Burke the media company intended to sell the club. As Burke later told writer Roger Kahn, Paley offered to sell the franchise to Burke if he could find financial backing. Steinbrenner, who had participated in a failed attempt to buy the Cleveland Indians from Vernon Stouffer one year earlier, was brought together with Burke by veteran baseball executive Gabe Paul. From to his death, George Steinbrenner spent most of his time in Tampa, Florida. After the season and the decision not to bring back manager Joe Torre, Steinbrenner was in poor enough health that he officially retired and handed control of the Yankees to his sons Hank and Hal Steinbrenner. Hank in particular shows similar traits to his father. World Series Winner 1977 World Series 1977 The World Series matched the defending champion Atlanta Braves against the New York Yankees, with the Yankees winning in six games, despite being outscored 26-18, to capture their first championship since 1958, and their 23rd overall. They also became the first team since the Los Angeles Dodgers Yankees lost to the Dodgers in 1958 to win four straight games after dropping the first two. The series was played between October 28 and November 4, broadcast on Fox, and watched by an average of roughly 19 million viewers. It marks, to date, the last World Series with a repeat champion. It was the first postseason Subway Series since 1984. The Yankees were in the World Series for the third straight year, fourth in the previous five, and 37th time overall the most of any team in the MLB, while the Mets made their fourth World Series appearance the most of any expansion franchise in the MLB and its first since winning the title in the World Series. The Yankees won the World Series again in With Ruth retired, Gehrig finally had a chance to take center stage, but it was only one year before a new star appeared, Joe DiMaggio. The team won an unprecedented four straight World Series titles from to The Yankees declared July 4, to be "Lou Gehrig Day", on which they retired his number 4, the first retired number in baseball. Gehrig made a famous speech

in which he declared himself to be "the luckiest man on the face of the earth. The baseball season was often described as the last year of the "Golden Era" before World War II and other realities intervened. It was a thrilling year as America watched two major events unfold: Ted Williams of the Red Sox hitting for the elusive .300. By the end of his hitting streak, DiMaggio hit in 56 consecutive games, the current major league record and one often deemed unbreakable. The Yankees still managed to pull out a win against the St. Louis Cardinals in the World Series. After a few slumping seasons, McCarthy was fired early in 1951. A few interim managers later, Bucky Harris took the job, righting the ship and taking the Yankees to a hard fought series victory against the Dodgers. Despite finishing only three games behind the Cleveland Indians in the pennant race, Harris was relieved of his duties and replaced by Casey Stengel, who had a reputation of being a clown and managing bad teams. His tenure as Yankee field manager, however, was marked with success. The "underdog" Yankees came from behind to catch and surprise a powerful Red Sox team on the last two days of the season, a face off that fueled the beginning of the modern Yankees' Red Sox rivalry. Bettering the clubs managed by Joe McCarthy, the Yankees won the World Series five consecutive times from 1949 to 1954 under Stengel, which continues to be the major league record. Stengel was a master at publicity for the team and for himself, even landing a cover story in Time magazine in 1950. The title was the only one of those five championships not to be won against either the New York Giants or Brooklyn Dodgers; it was won in four straight games against the Whiz Kids of the Philadelphia Phillies. In 1954, the Yankees won over 100 games, but the Indians took the pennant with an AL record 111 wins; was famously referred to as The Year the Yankees Lost the Pennant. In 1955, the Dodgers finally beat the Yankees in the World Series, after five previous Series losses to them, but the Yankees came back strong the next year. On October 8, 1955, in Game Five of the World Series against the Dodgers, pitcher Don Larsen threw the only perfect game in World Series history, [24] which remains the only perfect game in postseason play and was the only no-hitter of any kind to be pitched in postseason play until Roy Halladay pitched a no-hitter on October 6, 2001. In the World Series, the Yankees got their revenge against the Braves, and became the second team to win the Series after being down three-games-to-one. Because of this "special relationship" with the Yankees, he traded young players to them in exchange for cash and aging veterans. In 1954, Charles O. Finley purchased the Athletics and put an end to the trades. But the Yankees had already strengthened their supply of future prospects, which included a young outfielder named Roger Maris. He finished second in home runs one behind Mantle and total bases, and won a Gold Glove, which garnered enough votes for the American League MVP award. The year was one of the most memorable in Yankee history. It was 30 years before the dual record was done away with, and Maris held the record alone until Mark McGwire broke it in 1998. The Yankees won the pennant with a 108 record and went on to defeat the Cincinnati Reds in the World Series. The team finished the year with a record 108 home runs. After the departures of the Dodgers and Giants for the West Coast, New York City was a one-team town for the first time since professional play began. The Mets lost a record 103 games while the Yankees won the World Series, their tenth in the past sixteen years, defeating the San Francisco Giants in seven games. After the season, Yogi Berra, who had just retired from playing, took over managerial duties. The aging Yankees returned the next year for a fifth straight World Series, but were beaten in seven games by the St. Louis Cardinals. In fact, the Yankees finished in the second division in 1961—their first losing record in 40 years, and only their second in 47 years. In 1962, the Yankees finished last in the AL for the first time since 1955. It also marked their first consecutive losing seasons since 1954 and 1955. They finished next-to-last in 1963. The all-time Yankees were: Steinbrenner, Martin, Jackson, and Munson: It had greatly deteriorated by the late 1960s, and the surrounding neighborhood had gone south as well. CBS initially suggested renovations, but the team needed to play elsewhere, and the Mets refused to open their home, Shea Stadium, to the Yankees. A new stadium in the Meadowlands, across the Hudson River in New Jersey, was suggested

and was eventually built, as Giants Stadium , specifically for football. Finally, in mid, Mayor John Lindsay stepped in. The city bought the stadium and began an extensive two-year renovation period. Since the city owned Shea, the Mets had to allow the Yankees to play two seasons there. The renovations modernized the look of the stadium, significantly altered the dimensions, and reconfigured some of the seating. During and , Yankee Stadium was renovated into its final shape and structure, as shown here in , seven years before demolition. After the season , Steinbrenner made a move that started the modern era of free agency , signing star pitcher Catfish Hunter away from Oakland. Midway through the season , Steinbrenner made another move, hiring former second baseman Billy Martin as manager.

At a peace summit to unite the two leagues under similar rules, and establishing the World Series, American League President Ban Johnson lets it known he wants a team in New York. Johnson got 15 of the 16 Major League owners to agree, the lone dissenter was John T. Bush owner of the New York Giants. The two new owners quickly secured a piece of land on Broadway between 11th and 12th street and quickly put together a ballpark known as Hilltop Park. The Highlanders took the field for their first game on April 22nd, and lost to the Nats in Washington. The Highlanders would win their very first game the next day. A week later facing the Nats again, the Highlanders made their home debut a success with a win. The Highlanders chased the Boston Americans all year, catching them in August and trading first place back and forth into October. A key four game series at the end of the season would determine the pennant. In the first game Jack Chesbro defeated Boston to the Highlanders a half-game lead it was his 41st win, a 20th century record. However, the Pilgrims came back to win the next 2 to retake the lead. In the 4th game of the series, with Chesbro again pitching with the score tied in the top of the 9th, a wild pitch over the head of catcher Deacon McGuire would allow the Pilgrims pennant clinching run to score, as the Highlanders settled for 2nd place with a record of 77-55. Coming off a season in which they battled for first place until the end of the season the Highlanders are a tremendous disappointment, finishing in sixth place with a record of 68-70. The Highlanders lead the American League in late September before tailing off to finish three games behind the Chicago White Sox with a record of 77-55. The Highlanders continue a patten of up and down seasons, as they fall back into fifth place with a record of 77-55. The Highlanders come crashing down into last place for the first time in franchise history posting a horrendous record. The new interlocking NY would become the most recognizable logo in all of sports. In the first year the interlocking NY appeared on the uniform the team improved to a record of 77-55. After three consecutive losing seasons the Highlanders climb up to 2nd place posting a respectable record. In their first year in pinstriped the Highlanders struggle all season and finish in last place with a record of 68-70. However, the team still struggles in their first year officially known as the Yankees, and finishes in seventh place with a record of 68-70. The Yankees continue to struggle despite finishing in sixth place with a record of 68-70. The Yankees begin to show signs of improvement as they finish in fifth place with a record of 77-55. After a string of losing season the Yankees finally begin to show some promise, and put together a respectable record that was good enough for fourth place. The Yankees would go on to win 95 games coming up just three games short of the pennant. These acquisitions plus another record topping 59 HR from Babe Ruth were just what the Yankees need to win 98 games and their first pennant. The Yanks would get off to a flaying start winning the first 2 games of the best of 9 series by identical scores. The Giants would bounce back in the next two games to even the series. The Yankees would rebound to win Game 5, and took a lead in Game 6, but the Yankees would only score one more run in the entire series after that. The Yanks would lose the Babe to an injury and after the Giants came back to win the sixth game, the Yankees lost the series. After the series the Giants evicted the Yankees out of the Polo Grounds effective the end of the season. Despite

Babe Ruth missing two months due to injuries the Yankees still manage to win 94 games, and hold off the St. Louis Browns by one game for their second straight pennant, and Subway Series against the Giants. However, from that point on the Yankees would dominate the series winning the next two , and In Game 6 the Yankees would score five runs in the eighth to take their first of many World Series four games to two. The Yankees fall two games short in their quest for a fourth straight trip to the World Series with an record. In a year in which Babe Ruth was lost much of the season to surgery and suspension, the Yankees finish seventh with a record, it would be their last losing season 40 years. The suspensions to then Babe serve as warning and the Babe becomes more focused on baseball in the following season, and the Yankees would only get stronger. Meanwhile on June 2nd, Lou Gehrig begins his streak of 2, consecutive games played, with a pinch-hitting appearance for Pee Wee Wanniger. The Yankees would face the St. Louis Cardinals in hard fought 7-game World Series. After winning Game 5, the Yankees looked to have stranglehold taking a series lead heading back to the Bronx for Game 6, but Grover Cleveland Alexander shut down the Yanks in Game 6 to force a seventh and deciding game. In Game 7 Alexander would again shut down the Yankees stopping a two out Bases Loaded Rally in the 7th and getting the final seven outs to take the World Series. As a team the Yankees led the league in hitting. Their pitching also dominated compiling a 3. The Yanks dominance carried on to the World Series where the Yanks only trailed twice en-route to cruising to 4-game sweep of the Pittsburgh Pirates. Game 1 and 4 were close, the Yankees won each by one run, including win the final game in walk off fashion after Pirates pitcher Johnny Miljus uncorked a wild pitch in the bottom of the ninth. After running away with the pennant in the Yankees quickly learned that would not be as easy. However the Yankees need a mid-September sweep of the Philadelphia Athletics to win the pennant by three games. However, the Yankees would find things easier in the World Series against the St. The Yanks would extract revenge for in convincing fashion. Gehrig would drive in nine runs only one less than the Cards scored in the entire series. In series final game Babe Ruth would hit three Home Runs equaling the feat of , and outdoing the two Gehrig hit the day before. The Yankees started out the season by making history with their uniforms again, when they became the first team to make numbers a permanent part of the uniform. Other teams quickly adopted the idea and, by , uniform numbers became standard for all teams. However it would be a difficult year for the Yanks; by late September their pennant hopes were smashed by the Philadelphia Athletics, who would win the pennant by 16 games. However, on September 25th the season became unbearable when manager Miller Huggins who had led the Yanks since , and through their first three World Championships, and six pennants died suddenly of blood poisoning. The Yanks would go on to land in second place with an record. With Bob Shawkey guiding the Yankees the team would never play to their full potential finishing in third place with a record of After losing out on the American League pennant three straight years to the Philadelphia Athletics, the Yankees regained their dominant form, as Lou Gehrig would lead the way with RBI. Gehrig even topped the Bambino on June 3rd in Philadelphia when he became the very first player to hit four Home Runs in one game. Others would equal the feat; however Ruth would never equal the feat. The Yankees won games and took home the pennant by 13 games. Lou Gehrig, who hit. In Game 3 with the score tied in the fifth inning, Babe Ruth pointed his bat at pitcher Charlie Root. After taking two strikes, the Babe ripped the third pitch into the center field bleachers. The game was dubbed the All Star Game, and appropriately enough the star that shined brightest was the Babe who hit the first Home Run in All Star history and aided the AL to a win. However, the Yankees would fail to win the pennant falling seven games short with a record. However there were not many more milestones to come for the Bambino. Ruth

would only hit eight more Home Runs to finish the season with career HRs. The Yankees would than release the aging Babe Ruth after the season in which they finished in second place with a record. The Babe would go on to hit six more homers with Boston Braves, but it was an end of an era for the Yankees, and all of baseball. In their first season without Babe Ruth the Yankees fall just three games short of the American League Pennant with a solid record.

According to the franchise itself the logo origin is as follows: The design was created in by Louis B. As you can already see from this text, the story has some facts mixed in with a bit of speculation. This was the Medal of Valor, the most prestigious award for police bravery in the line of duty. Here is a picture of the front. The reverse side confirms part of the origins story as well. There was indeed a John McDowell that received this award in However, the history of this logo has a bit of a preface, given that this team was not always called the Yankees. They were actually founded in as the Baltimore Orioles. This was their first logo: The biggest change came when the franchise found itself under new ownership, which moved the team to New York. The transition earned themselves a new nickname - the NY Highlanders. As such the logo also needed an upgrade, experiencing various iterations over the years before it would morph into the one we know today - As you can see here, another bit of the official mythos has come unraveled, as some experimentation was made overlapping letters N and Y in the logo. This is a change that would not last long. The following versions would feature a radical departure from this style. This would be the moment that the team would settle on a timeless design which does indeed appear to be partially inspired by the NYPD Medal of Valor. A new "Bat in the Hat" insignia would also make its public debut in This particular logo has become a popular choice for Yankees memorabilia and souvenirs while the franchise continues to represent itself with the same insignia from , which has proven to be a timeless classic for the most successful team in baseball history.

They also won 40 American League pennants between and . The New York Yankees were the American League East division leaders every year from to and in , , and , and they won the American League Wild Card in , , and . By , the team was known as the New York Yankees. The team was not very strong at first, but they did finish second in the league in , and . From through , the New York Yankees did not see post-season play. By , the Yankees were back on top with a new manager, Billy Martin. The next downhill trend for the Yankees began when Billy Martin was fired in . Although the Yankees won the American League pennant in , they would not win another one until . The Yankees started their upward swing again in , but the season ended prematurely due to a baseball strike. Since , the Yankees have stayed near the top, winning five Wild Cards , , , , , 7 American League pennants , , , and 5 World Series , . The Yankees manager from through , Joe Girardi, was a catcher with the team in the late s and he was hired to replace Joe Torre as manager in . The Yankees finished the season with a record of wins to 59 losses. They won the World Series that year. The following season they finished with 95 wins and 67 losses. In , they had a similar regular season, winning 97 games and losing . In , they once again had 95 wins and 67 losses and they finished in first place in the AL East division. They were plagued by injuries in and lost top players, including Mark Teixeira, Derek Jeter, and Alex Rodriguez, for most of the season.
