Dialect Locals often refer to the town as Uttoxeter - you-tox-eat-er - which probably closely resembles the original pronunciation of the Anglo Saxon name - "Wotocheshede". Some refer Uttoxeter as Uttcheter. A very select group of young locals colloquially refer to it as Utah sometimes spelled Uttah , Uttoh and Utox. One of the local papers, the Uttoxeter Advertiser, is referred to as the Stunner. Transport Uttoxeter is on the main A50 and has a mainline railway station, Uttoxeter railway station which was opened by the North Staffordshire Railway on October 1, , however, there were earlier stations opened by the North Staffordshire Railway, with full information to be found at Uttoxeter railway station. Buses to Stafford run every 2 hours; buses to Burton upon Trent run every hour. There is a revised time table in the summer where frequency of this service is extended to every hour. At one time it was also the terminus of a branch of the Caldon Canal aka the Uttoxeter Canal , although most signs of this, apart from an area of Uttoxeter called "The Wharf", have now disappeared - largely because much of the bed of the canal was used in the 19th century as the route of the North Staffordshire Railway main line from Uttoxeter to Macclesfield which has now also disappeared. The Bamford family had previously started Bamfords, later Bamford International Farm Machinery which was a large employer in the town from the end of the 19th century through to the early s when it gradually went into decline before closing in Uttoxeter celebrated its year anniversary of the awarding of a Market charter in , which underpins the market provision on Saturdays and Wednesdays in particular, and other festival markets. Edward McCann was born in Hereford in the s and his family originally came from Ireland. He served in the Army and on his return to England settled in Uttoxeter in about He was a Sergeant Major in the local Yeomanry Cavalry and became Assistant Overseer, responsible for collecting poor rates in the town. In he began taking photographic portraits and by had opened a tobacconists shop. The photography business was taken over by his son, Alfred in , who in turn was succeeded in by his son Gerald â€” The business finally closed in One of the main employers in Uttoxeter is the global construction, demolition and agricultural equipment company JCB. The firm is headquartered in Rocester, with a factory in Uttoxeter and one in Cheadle. Elkes were the creators of the famous malted milk biscuit. Agriculture is still important to the local economy. The town is set in rich dairy farming country. Uttoxeter previously housed a large dairy and was historically a major trader in butter and cheese. The farming cooperative Dairy Farmers of Britain had a large dairy in the nearby village of Fole, but this closed in The next year the firm went into administration. A new cattle market is due to be built in the town, after the old one was demolished in Uttoxeter town centre has gone through a development scheme, with the Market Place, Market Street, Queens Street, Carter Street, and High Street having undergone a major transformation. Dovefields Retail Park was first created in with the opening of a Tesco supermarket on the edge of the town. The retail park was further expanded in with the creation of seven large retail outlets. In , work commenced on a new entertainment development. The old Cattle Market, which closed in November , has been demolished to make way for a retail and housing development. There have been significant delays to the scheme, but developers say they hope building work will commence before the end of A replacement cattle market has

been granted planning permission elsewhere in the town, but after several years no development has taken place. The existing town hall is currently under evaluation to ascertain if it can fulfil a wider range of functions. A building inspection has reported some serious structural problems with the current state of the building. The old JCB site in the centre of Uttoxeter is currently lying vacant and is awaiting redevelopment, after the firm moved operations to one of its sites on the edge of town. It has lodged plans to build hundreds of homes, a park, a retail development, health complex and petrol station on the old Pinfold Street site. Uttoxeter is on the main A50 trunk road. The town also has a mainline railway station, Uttoxeter railway station which was opened by the North Staffordshire Railway on 2 October, however, there were earlier stations opened by the North Staffordshire Railway. Uttoxeter Civic Society was re-established in to act as a civic watchdog and to protect and promote the history and heritage of Uttoxeter. Uttoxeter Choral Society was founded in and is the third oldest choral society in the United Kingdom. They have a continuous record of making music which is matched by very few other societies. The Uttoxeter May Festival, a traditional folk music and dance event, takes place in early May every year. It is also the home of the Acoustic Festival of Britain.
