

1: Identity vs. Role Confusion | Real Me Project

A real identity crisis is when we don't form a proper sense of self as an adolescent (see the section below "why do I lack a sense of identity"). It results in certain ongoing behaviours throughout our adult life.

I want you to actually fill as much of the card as you can with your first name. This is not an art class. We do not need perfection. We need you to spend no more than five seconds writing your name. So each of you now has an index card which has your first name on it. Now if you have lots of films you love then pick a genre and pick the favourite among that genre, so whatever that favourite film is. And describe to your partner which part of the world would you describe as paradise, that part of the world that you would describe as paradise. You might not have actually been there, but I want you to share with your partner that part of the world, wherever that may be, would be paradise. So for example I would share that with Stevo, Stevo would share those two things with me. And now Stevo becomes Mark and he has a crisis of identity because now when he moves on to a new person he introduces himself as Mark. Of course naturally at the end of that next conversation that Mark has, the cards are swapped again and Mark is now assumed by a whole new person. You could probably fill in the gaps of what happens from there. Try to hang on to it for a little bit longer. Keep doing that probably for three, four, five or six times. And then having introduced that person we will actually go find that person in the circle and first of all check, does that sound like you. And then hand that card to the person to whom it actually belongs and then they will introduce the person of the card that they are holding. Who would like to start? Does that sound like you, James? Sunny beach but very close And Lion King? So pass the card over to James, and James will now introduce himself as Lucy. Okay Lucy, introduce yourself. And where is the real Lucy? Okay Lucy, does that sound like you? We should just give a little hand to all those first two people, I forgot for the first person. So Lucy, who are you? Okay, good job, Reilly. Your favourite movie is Boondock Days and rainforest is your paradise. Okay, a little clap. My favourite movie is Deadpool and I really like the Maldives. If your group does not already have individual name-tags, start by distributing a set of index cards and pens and ask everyone to write their names really big on a card. Next, invite each person to think of their response to a number of specific questions. For example, you could ask each person to think of: Their favourite movie; What they love most about where they live; What they would do if they won the lottery; or What was their first paid job as a kid. Having thought about this information, ask everyone to start mingling and greet one other person to form a pair. If you have an odd number of people, a group of three works fine. Explain that you would now like each pair to get to know one another by sharing anything that is of interest, but at a minimum, they must cover the responses to the three questions you announced. Encourage each person to pay particular attention to these three bits of information about their partner. No need to say anymore just yet. After a few groans and feverish re-checking of data, the process resumes, but this time, each person assumes the identity of their most recent partner. Permit the banter to flow for 10 minutes or so, inviting each person to complete as many exchanges of identity as possible. By this point, everyone is thoroughly confused as to who they truly are. This person goes next, introducing him or herself as the person named on the name-tag they are holding, and so on. Continue until every person has been introduced. Encourage people to write their name very large to fill as much of the space on the index card. Nothing worse than greeting someone who is wearing a name tag with very small writing. Sometimes people feel the urge to get the information right, and seek out the person belonging to the card they are holding. Half the fun is found in the genuine reporting of incorrect information about others. Further to the above point, people often want to write down the information they receive from their new partner to help them remember the correct data. Again, actively discourage this unless you have a reason to allow this to occur – better to be wrong and get a laugh, than to introduce everyone correctly and only get a smile. Popular Variations Make Notes: If memory-recall is an issue for your group, allow each person to write down the three or more bits of information about their partner new identity on the back of the card. Exchanges proceed as per normal, but this time, people have a crutch to lean on. Although this version tends not to be as much fun as the original because the number of memory recall errors plummet, it will still serve as a useful get-to-know-you exercise.

Other factors that lead to identity crisis include stress, troubles and societal demands. Lack of ideologies and values, experimenting roles and being a leader may also cause identity crisis. Identity crisis refers to the failure to attain ego identity during adolescence.

Broadly speaking, identity refers to the overall character or personality of an individual or group. For example, a young mother might define her identity as that which reflects the essence of who she is such as being a woman, spouse, and parent and how she got to be that way. A business can have its own identity, perhaps defined by its unique corporate culture or its advertising history. For example, a musical group or the cast of a television show might have to work together for a long period of time before its performances flow smoothly and effortlessly and it is able to establish its own voice or overall character. Adolescents as well as adults can pass through identity crises that refer to periods of personal uncertainty or confusion. When a sports coach talks about his or her team finding its identity, this may refer to the development or recognition of a consistent way of playing or performing. For example, when politicians, celebrities, or other public figures engage in controversial behavior, those individuals must frequently work to reclaim or redefine their identities. A company that has made poor business decisions might be referred to as having lost its corporate identity. The modern phenomenon of identity theft is another example of identity loss, although it is more accurate to refer to this phenomenon as identification or ID theft. The popularity of the identity theft label suggests that an important part of lay definitions of individual identities are the public, demographic, and commercial means of identification. As the previous examples illustrate, the popular boundaries of the identity concept are quite broad. This concept is similarly pervasive and broad in the theories and research of the social sciences and humanities. Self and identity are frequently used interchangeably by such theorists and researchers. In fact, sometimes writers will combine the terms into concepts such as self-identity or ego-identity. Within the social sciences and humanities, different disciplines emphasize different components of the concept. Thus, it is useful to consider how different fields define and operationalize identity. Social science theorists and researchers distinguish a large number of different kinds of identity. Examples of identity types include racial, ethnic, group, social, religious, occupational, gender and sex role, cultural, physical and bodily, musical, athletic, academic, and so forth. Among these different identity types, a common distinction is made between personal and social identities. Personal identity usually refers to the unique characteristics of a person, including personality traits, personal values, opinions and preferences, physical characteristics, and career and lifestyle choices. Regardless of whether one focuses on personal or social facets, identity development involves a sense of sameness, continuity, and unity. This can refer to the physical, psychological, and social aspects of the person. Thus, most social scientists agree that identity is something that develops over time and requires organization and integration, often achieved through the resolution of personal or social conflicts or crises. The failure to achieve some degree of identity coherence is thought to be a symptom of psychological, social, or cultural problems. Identity also entails an individual commitment to a set of values and goals associated with specific characteristics. People who highly value their social identities are more likely to act in ways that are consistent with those roles than people who do not value their social identities. Identity development is, therefore, tied to how people think about themselves and how they decide which aspects of their experience are most important as they define themselves. In other words, the development of identity involves personal and social processes of definition, construction, and negotiation. The psychologist Roy Baumeister described several influential social trends in European and American societies running from about 1800 to 1900. During these centuries, a variety of social, cultural, and economic changes corresponded with a shift in how philosophers, artists, writers, and the lay public viewed personhood and identity. For example, people began to consider the possibility that there is a hidden self; that individuality is important; that there is a separation of their public, social lives from their private lives; and that children develop and have their own potentialities worthy of attention. In other words, the boundaries of identity became increasingly broad and malleable. Baumeister argued that these trends continued through the twentieth century, reflecting an age of mass

consumption, greater occupational choices, dramatic technological changes, and the marketing of both products and people. The net effect of these social, cultural, and economic changes is that people in industrialized societies are now plagued with difficulties in defining their identities. Because of the loss of traditional ways of knowing who one is, the more abstract, elusive sense of identity makes it increasingly difficult to define. Much more than was the case one hundred or two hundred years ago, people must work to find or uncover who they are, in order to resolve the dilemmas of modern personhood. Contemporary identity requires choice, achievement, and frequent self-redefinitions as opposed to the passive assignment of identity of the past. This causes a seeking out of experiences and material possessions in order to avoid feelings of worthlessness or identity confusion.
