Legend[edit] According to the traditional narrative, Catherine was the daughter of Constus, the governor of Egyptian Alexandria during the reign of the emperor Maximian . A vision of the Madonna and Child persuaded her to become a Christian. When the persecutions began under Maxentius , she went to the emperor and rebuked him for his cruelty. The emperor summoned 50 of the best pagan philosophers and orators to dispute with her, hoping that they would refute her pro-Christian arguments, but Catherine won the debate. Several of her adversaries, conquered by her eloquence, declared themselves Christians and were at once put to death. She was scourged so cruelly and for so long, that her whole body was covered with wounds, from which the blood flowed in streams. The spectators wept with pity; but Catherine, strengthened by God, stood with her eyes raised to heaven, without giving a sign of suffering or fear. He ordered her to be imprisoned without food, so she would starve to death. During the confinement, angels tended her wounds with salve. Catherine was fed daily by a dove from Heaven and Christ also visited her, encouraging her to fight bravely, and promised her the crown of everlasting glory. Upon the failure of Maxentius to make Catherine yield by way of torture, he tried to win the beautiful and wise princess over by proposing marriage. The saint refused, declaring that her spouse was Jesus Christ , to whom she had consecrated her virginity. The furious emperor condemned Catherine to death on a spiked breaking wheel , but, at her touch, it shattered. Catherine herself ordered the execution to commence. A milk-like substance rather than blood flowed from her neck. In , her incorrupt body was discovered by monks from the Sinai Monastery. The monks found on the surface of the granite on which her body lay, an impression of the form of her body. Her hair still growing, and a constant stream of the most heavenly fragranced healing oil issuing from her body. This oil produced countless miracles. Her relics include her left hand, often warm to the touch and her head. Her incorrupt body is not publicly displayed. The main church was built between and , and the monastery became a major pilgrimage site for devotees of Catherine and the other relics and sacred sites there. The site is sacred to Christianity , Islam , and Judaism. There is no evidence that Katherine herself was a historical figure and she may well have been a composite drawn from memories of women persecuted for their faith. Many aspects of her Passio are clearly legendary and conform to well-known hagiographical topoi. Catherine of Alexandria, by Carlo Crivelli Saint Catherine was one of the most important saints in the religious culture of the late Middle Ages , and arguably considered the most important of the virgin martyrs, a group including Saint Agnes , Margaret of Antioch , Saint Barbara , Saint Lucy , Valerie of Limoges and many others. Her power as an intercessor was renowned and firmly established in most versions of her hagiography , in which she specifically entreats Christ at the moment of her death to answer the prayers of those who remember her martyrdom and invoke her name. The development of her medieval cult was spurred by the reported rediscovery of her body around the year at Mount Sinai , with hair still growing and a constant stream of healing oil issuing from her body. It was not alone in the west, however, accompanied by many, scattered shrines and altars dedicated to Catherine, which existed throughout France and England. Some were better known sites, such as Canterbury and Westminster , which claimed a phial of her oil, brought back from Mount Sinai by Edward the Confessor. Wodelarke may have chosen the name in homage to Catherine of Valois , mother of Henry VI of England , although it is more likely that it was named as part of the Renaissance cult of

Saint Catharine, who was a patron saint of learning. Saint Catherine also had a large female following, whose devotion was less likely to be expressed through pilgrimage. The importance of the virgin martyrs as the focus of devotion and models for proper feminine behavior increased during the Late Middle Ages. Catherine in particular was used as an exemplar for women, a status which at times superseded her intercessory role. In the Western church, the popularity of her cult began to reduce in the 18th century. However, the Russian Orthodox Church celebrates it on 24 November. The exact origin of this tradition is not known. In 11th-century Kyivan-Rus , the feast day was celebrated on 25 November. A story that Empress Catherine the Great did not wish to share her patronal feast with the Leavetaking of the feast of the Presentation of the Theotokos and hence changed the date is not supported by historical evidence. The Catholic Encyclopedia describes her historical importance: Ranked with St Margaret and St Barbara as one of the fourteen most helpful saints in heaven , she was unceasingly praised by preachers and sung by poets. It is believed that Jacques-Benigne Bossuet dedicated to her one of his most beautiful panegyrics and that Adam of St. Victor wrote a magnificent poem in her honour: *Vox Sonora nostri chori*. In many places her feast was celebrated with the utmost solemnity, servile work being suppressed and the devotions attended by great numbers of people. In several dioceses of France it was observed as a Holy Day of Obligation up to the beginning of the 17th century, the splendour of its ceremonial eclipsing that of the feasts of some of the Apostles. Numberless chapels were placed under her patronage and her statue was found in nearly all churches, representing her according to medieval iconography with a wheel , her instrument of torture. In France, unwed women who have attained the age of 25 wear richly decorated bonnets on the day of her feast. Favorites also are melons cut into circles with sherbet "hubs," or cookies shaped as spiked wheels with icing. Meanwhile, owing to several circumstances in his life, Saint Nicholas of Myra was considered the patron of young bachelors and students , and Saint Catherine became the patroness of young maidens and female students. Looked upon as the holiest and most illustrious of the virgins of Christ after the Blessed Virgin Mary , it was natural that she, of all others, should be worthy to watch over the virgins of the cloister and the young women of the world. The spiked wheel having become emblematic of the saint, wheelwrights and mechanics placed themselves under her patronage. Finally, as according to tradition, she not only remained a virgin by governing her passions and conquered her executioners by wearying their patience, but triumphed in science by closing the mouths of sophists , her intercession was implored by theologians , apologists , pulpit orators , and philosophers. Before studying, writing, or preaching, they besought her to illumine their minds, guide their pens, and impart eloquence to their words. Pilgrims to her monastery on Mt Sinai are given a ring, which has been placed on the relics of the saint as an evlogia blessing in remembrance of their visit. She can usually be easily recognised as she is richly dressed and crowned, as befits her rank as a princess, and often holds or stands next to a segment of her wheel as an attribute. She often has long unbound blonde or reddish hair unbound as she is unmarried. The vision of Saint Catherine of Alexandria usually shows the Infant Christ, held by the Virgin, placing a ring one of her attributes on her finger, following some literary accounts, although in the version in the Golden Legend he appears to be adult, and the marriage takes place among a great crowd of angels and "all the celestial court", [30] and these may also be shown. 3: Le Chemin de Saint Jacques - Part 1 / Le Puy en Velay to Figeac | Spanish Steps

The Belle Epoque splendour of the Hotel Saint-Jacques awaits! A Summer Of Fun For You In Paris. Cheer along with the rest of Paris on July 14th, the French National.

As the travelling over the snow in this island is less difficult in the month of March, than walking overland is at any other season of the year, I had long had an intention of commencing a visitation of the southern and western shores of Newfoundland, in the early part of that month; and, for this purpose, had made an appointment with a guide, who lives in Trinity Bay, that he should come across at that time to be my pilot through the country. His recommendation to me was the fact of his having lived, some time back, four years with the Micmac Indians,--a probation which must have given him, I conceived, some acquaintance with the mode of travelling in this untractable island. He came to St. The season was more than usually advanced; and a greater quantity of snow having fallen than had been remembered for twenty years, the travelling was more easy than it commonly is in the winter: This I did on the afternoon of Tuesday, I then proceeded with my knapsack, in which were 14 lbs. For some distance we missed our way, but as we could ascertain the points of the compass by observing the inclination of the topmost branches of the juniper or larch-trees, we regained our path some time after dark; and by a slippery wood-path, on which we had many falls, we reached the south shore of Conception Bay, and the house of Miller, a respectable planter, by ten P. I assembled the females of the family, however, and read and explained a chapter of the Bible, and offered up prayers with them before I retired to bed; and the next morning, Wednesday, 18,--The men, before their work, joined us in the same employment. After this, I started in the snow for Mr. There I met the Rev. Thomas Martin Wood, who, in addition to his usual labours at Petty Harbour, pays monthly visits to the people of his old charge upon this south shore of Conception Bay, and again at Pouch Cove, near Cape Francis. After attending and assisting at a marriage which he was solemnizing, I crossed through the "slob ice," which was very thick in Conception Bay, to Port de Grave, four leagues, in three hours. This is the centre of the mission of the Reverend Charles Blackman. One of his circuit churches, that of St. I had been more fortunate in my passage across the bay than three young men of St. I was confined a day at Mr. I regretted to find that Mr. Joyce, an exceedingly kind friend to the church and clergy, whom I had found here on former visits, had paid the debt of nature. Blackman had been engaged to attend a funeral at Bay Roberts yesterday; but the storm had made all close prisoners to their houses. It may give some idea of the difficulty of communication in the winter, even in the neighbourhood of St. I found that Ridout, a respectable young man, who had been used to keep a congregation together upon the south shore of Conception Bay, had died last spring, from the exertion and exposure consequent on going round the head of the bay at that inclement season on foot; and Hodge, the packet-man of Killigrews, was just recovering from a most severe cold caught a few days before, from his having been washed overboard in a gale. Here my guide and I struck into the woods at eleven, A. I broke into the ice of one brook on my way, and by half-past seven, P. The distance is not more than fifteen miles by my compass, but the necessarily circuitous course which we were obliged to take to avoid a steep hill in one direction, a running brook, or a thick wood, in another, made it at least twenty. The distance which persons, liable to serve on petty juries, may be obliged to travel that they may meet the circuit judges in this island, is, from these circumstances, not very easily defined. I have met with places in Fortune Bay, two or three miles only from each other, to visit which by land in winter, it might be necessary to make a circuit of fifteen miles, to get round the deep precipitous chasms or "gulshes" and ravines, which cross from the coast into the interior. The church of St. It had been decently painted last summer, through Mr. I gave notice of my intention of administering the holy communion in it on Sunday, There were fourteen communicants after morning service at church, and I also administered the same sacrament to an aged person, a man of seventy-seven, in his own house, who remembered the French being in Trinity Bay in I held two full services, baptized two children at church, and one in private. As there was no stove in the church which could be lighted, and the weather was exceedingly cold, we suffered much during the service. After the two services I walked to Dildo Cove, by a church-path made by the people, which is very creditable to the devotional feeling of the settlers. Here the

weather detained one at the house of Samuel Pretty, a respectable old planter. It was delightful to bear this old churchman contrast, with gratitude, the spiritual condition of the people in this part of the island now, with what it was when he first came out from Chard, in Somersetshire, sixty years ago: Pretty came thither, they had been the scenes of some very savage murders, into which, such was the imperfect state of the magistracy of Newfoundland at that period, no inquiry whatever was made. Indeed, in some parts of the island which I have visited, infanticide, and violence terminating in death, would scarcely create inquiry now. While I was there, New Harbour was the scene of a sad drunken revel at a Roman Catholic funeral and wake. A wolf had been shot in this neighbourhood a short time before my visit. Also a large species of fish, called the horse-mackarel, resembling that fish in every particular, but ten feet in length, had been killed here last summer, by a girl with a "pew," or fork used for throwing fish from the boats on to the "stages. Several old Bedlamer seals had been already killed here, which, with the sea-birds which were now very numerous, supplied the inhabitants with very acceptable provisions after the scarcity of a long unbroken winter. The snow-path was stained with the blood of Bedlamer seals, which had been hauled over it. We had plenty of work for the ice-pounder in this cove and in the bay, as it was full of a species of ice, significantly called by the people, "swish-ice", which, when struck with the oar, makes a sound similar to that of straw when thrashed with a stick. Assembled two dozen people, all who had not gone into the woods for their work before our arrival, for full service, at the tilt of William Pollett. The otter and the fox, consequently, at this season, are generally to be found very near each other. The "barber," a vapour so called from its cutting qualities, was distinctly visible upon the water this morning. It arises, I believe, from the airs being colder than the water I was glad, on the approach of day, to turn myself towards the sun, which rose most brilliantly this cold morning. No description can convey an idea of the beauty of the overfalling stalactites of ice, some white through, some transparent, which hung down from the rugged cliffs on the side of this fine arm of the sea, till they nearly touched the water. The unremitting attention, and the not unfrequent visits of the Rev. William Bullock, of Trinity, and of his assistant upon the south shore of the bay, the Rev. William Nesbitt, left me no children, beyond mere infants, to baptize in this neighbourhood. I was again upon my way, on foot, through the woods, leaving the remarkable hill, called the Chapel Tolt, behind, and the Long Hill Deer country, on my left; and by half-past five got over the crusted snow of Long Harbour, in Placentia Bay. The country at this time presented an appearance quite different from that presented by the vegetation when affected by a moistness of the atmosphere which is afterwards operated upon by sudden frosts, and is improperly denominated here, a silver thaw. The present appearance was much more beautiful, although that cannot but be much admired. The under current of air had been sufficiently cold to freeze rain upon its reaching the earth, or alighting upon any exposed vegetable object, although the upper media, through which it had passed, permitted it still to fall as rain. As soon as this transparent liquid had alighted upon a branch of evergreen, or on a blade of grass, which projected above the snow, it had congealed; giving, through its transparent covering, a brighter tint to every colour of the objects which it enveloped. As the rain had continued to fall very fast for several hours while the lower air was in this state, this bright incrustation had collected on every object, even on those which were most minute, and offered the least firm support to such a weighty girdle, to the depth of at least an inch. The splendour of the spectacle which was presented by woods, shrubs, and under-brush, thus brilliantly illuminated in a morning of unclouded sunshine, was greater than any effort of art could come near to imitate. It left all the spectacles of scenic illusion, or the imaginative creations of fairy descriptions, far, far behind the reality of the natural phenomenon, which, though it was calculated most surely to fix the gaze of admiring crowds, only called forth now the grateful admiration of one fond admirer of the gospel of nature. Yet this profusion of sparkling beauty was not lost: O ye ice and snow! The poor widower, who was my host, spoke of his deceased wife with deep affection: Although these services, which I begged my presence might not be permitted to interrupt, were mixed with much which I deem error, yet I could not but wish that many a careless protestant could have seen this pious Romanist, and been led to imitate so praise worthy an attention to the religious interests of his children. I heard in the evening, that of three Englishmen who had been for years settled among them, one alone, a native of Greenwich, had not turned to the Romish faith. I went, therefore, to visit him on the morning of Thursday, 26,--At his tilt, over a frozen pond or lake,

about two miles from the harbour, When I reached his comfortless tilt, of which there was no part, except the excavated door-way, and the top of the chimney visible above the snow, I found he was from home. He had heard the preceding evening of the arrival in the settlement of a clergyman of his church, and attempted to cross the ice of the harbour after dark to have some conversation with me; had broken through the ice in the attempt, and had in consequence of his wet condition, slept at the tilt in the harbour, which I had passed at day-break. I returned thither, and found him at the house of J. On conversing with J. I found that he had been twenty-one years in the country, and was still pennyless, the poor servant of the other Englishman, H. His fondness for ardent spirits, he informed me, had kept him thus poor, and he could trace to this source all his lapses, and all his misfortunes. He assured me in our conversation that he had foresworn the further use of spirits. I told him of a strength greater than his own; this I entreated him to implore. He was much affected by a prayer in which I proposed he should join me in his tilt: It will give some idea of the prevailing use of spirits in this island, and of the consequent discouragement which the minister is doomed to experience, if I mention that notwithstanding all which I had said against the use of this intoxicating stimulant, in all which he had heartily acquiesced, and bringing the test of his own melancholy experience, had declared voluntarily, that he had left it off, he yet offered to myself, on my rising from my knees, what is called "a morning", from, a little keg, which he drew from under his straw bed; and, on my reminding, him, when about to help himself; that he had engaged to break off this habit, he excused himself by saying he had made a reservation for the use of the remaining contents of that keg. I was reminded of Jeremiah xiii. I promised the poor fellow a prayer-book, which he was most anxious to possess; a few other suitable books shall accompany it, and I pray, though almost against hope, that he may be assisted to keep his resolution. A cock crowing during the preceding, night, was said, by an old woman in the company, to portend rain: I found the next day, as I subsequently did on many other occasions during my present trip, that this augury was quite correct. We were put across Long Harbour arm, below the ice, in a punt, and walked from the quay, a point in the woods, through some thick brushwood, and over barrens to Ship Harbour Point, opposite to Little Placentia. Here a storm of snow and wind, followed by rain, which prevented my proceeding by land or by water, detained me till Monday, March 2. At this time last year, however, persons might walk from this side of Placentia Bay direct to Burin, which is at least twenty-four leagues across the open bay on the firm ice. As I had sent my man by land to Placentia to give notice of my being so near, Mr. Tucker, of the firm of Penny and Neve, of Poole, took advantage of a lull in the wind, and kindly sent a boat for me, which landed me at his wharf in the afternoon. Here I was greatly indebted to Mrs. Tucker for much humane attention, and luxuriated in a comfortable bed for the first time since I had left New Harbour, Trinity Bay, on the 25th ult. While Newfoundland belonged to, the French, this place was the seat of government. Within the memory of several of the present inhabitants, Placentia was a garrison town of our own, and there are still the remains of bomb-proof batteries in tolerable repair, faced with Portland stone. There is here a valuable service of communion plate, which bears an inscription, notifying, that it was given by his Royal Highness Prince William, Henry, in There are, also, a splendid folio prayer-book and bible, and a new version of the Psalms, which were presented to the church in , by Thomas Saunders, Esq. He is a Roman catholic, but most hospitably invited me to his house, and entertained me, although he was very busily engaged in sending out his sealing vessels to the ice, and was, besides, an invalid; and so good a feeling towards the church exists generally in this part of Newfoundland, that an aged widow lady, a Roman catholic, to whom, in conversing respecting the communion plate, I expressed the wish that it could be used monthly, and the books each week, responded evidently from the heart, with the wish that it could be so. It should be observed, in justice to the Roman catholics of this bay, that they are of a character very different from that of the more recent Irish settlers in the vicinity of St. The hospitality with which I was received by the settlers of that communion in this bay carried me pleasantly back, in recollection, to the description given by our Missionary Auspach, of his own reception in Conception Bay. His comforts were attended to with the most cordial and anxious care, even by the wildest Irishman, or the most bigoted Roman catholics. The poor fellow did not know the meaning of the terms he was using;--but one of this communion made me smile, when, to recommend himself to me, as distinguished from a strict Romanist, he told me he was a "",--and then, as though he had not gone far enough, he corrected himself, and said, "I am a Latitudinarian, sir, I mean.

Placentia has been visited, since the removal of a regular Missionary from the station, by the Bishop of Nova Scotia, and by Reverend Messrs. Bullock, Burt, Robertson, Laugherne, and Pering;--yet so long has the church been shut up, that this was the first occasion on which the royal donor of the communion service had been prayed for here in public liturgy, as King. Walking the Chemin de Saint-Jacques from Eauze to Saint-Jean-Pied-de-Port As the GR 65 draws nearer to its final destination, meandering from Eauze to Saint-Jean-Pied-de-Port, it passes through some of the most spectacular scenery to be found along the Chemin de Saint-Jacques du-Puy.

Such symbolic and significant pieces of architecture are not new accomplishments for the Alvaro Siza Vieira office, though this one holds a novel significance. It is the first church built in Frances Brittany region in the 21st Century; sited in a neighbourhood south of Rennes, a broad-brush residential area consisting of mostly five-storey housing blocks. It closes off the U-shaped and L-shaped master plans of the surrounding buildings, creating a courtyard typology in its context and becomes a signifier in the landscape along the small river at its edge. As it does not sit on a central corner of a city block, with large entry steps and a glorified civic presence, its positioning and architectural response becomes quite important and unique. One of the key accomplishments of the Church is that it begins to tie its formal response to the local residents by entering as a significant object in the landscape and also an extension of the civic and pedestrian facilities that the neighbourhood shares at ground level. Gestures of excavated volumes and detailed incisions begin to transform the building into a unique ceremonial space that resonates in its context. This circular volume houses the main Chapel holding up to people. By floating the main Chapel, the ground floor is freed up for social and administrative use, allowing the Chapel to be viewed as an object of sanctity with greater access to natural light, separate to the directorial areas. Along side the building, also made of white concrete, are two concrete pillars, bent at their peak and suspending ornate ceremonial bells. These volumes cantilever the superimposed cylindrical chapel at the second floor and free up the ground level for the Parish Centre. The entrance is small and homely as with other administrative entrances; each with fine timber detailing which emits a warm tempered glow through them. On the opposite side to the entrance or entrances are large full-length windows at ground floor, resemblant of a living room. These almost residential details, engage the surrounding open space and walkways, giving the sensation of a neighbourly openness and a clever social response to the community and other buildings. These minimal openings at ground level also help establish the building as a solid presence in the natural environment; where the heaviness and symbolic nature of the church is still achieved above, in its form, height and scale. Upon entries, the heaviness of the concrete form is beautifully excavated and glimpses of wooden detailing are exemplified and dragged internally; drawing certain moments of the ritualistic procession through to the Chapel. Access between floors is via a lift and two staircases; one exposed and the other concealed to the restricted access sacristy. At the second level, within the main cylindrical Chapel, contains the baptismal font, a semi-circular apse and the image of the Virgin and the Tabernacle all to the south. Laterally to the north is a bespoke wooden crucifix creating a diagonal axis to the main staircase that defines the position of the altar. Light reflects down the curved walls controlled by a suspended rectangular volume above the congregation zone. Simple and beautifully made furniture, sculptures and detailing of natural wood by Alvaro Siza, sit effortlessly within this space; not distracting the simplicity of the architecture but weighing with aesthetic and monastic importance. It is an architectural triumph in both its residential context, and of the discipline of religious architecture in the 21st century.

Jacques was the first outcome of the journey to Italy, and in precision and splendour of style it marks a distinct progress. The first ascent was made in by two Chamonix men, Jacques Balmat and Dr Michel Paccard, and the second in by Balmat with two local men. Pernambuco was first settled in by Christovao Jacques who founded a settlement on the Rio Iguarassu that was afterwards abandoned. In a French expedition organized in Canada under Jacques Marquette and Louis Joliet sailed down the Mississippi to the mouth of the Arkansas, and nine years later Rene Robert Cavelier, sieur de la Salle, reached the mouth of the river, took formal possession of the country which it drains, and named it Louisiana in honour of Louis XIV. He was then cleansed and re-clothed, his room cleaned, and during the day he was visited by his new attendant, a creole and a compatriot of Josephine de Beauharnais, named Jean Jacques Christophe Laurent , who had from the 8th of November onwards assistance for his charge from a man named Gomin. Jacques Vieau established here a post for the North-west Company of fur traders in The history of the later Crusades, from the Fifth to the Eighth, enters into the continuations of William of Tyre above mentioned; while the Historia orientalis of Jacques de Vitry, who had taken part in the Fifth Crusade, and died in , embraces the history of events till the third book being a later addition. His draughtsmanship is better than that of Jacques, whom he did not, however, rival in spirit, colour or composition. A generation later appeared Baptiste Massillon , who was to Bossuet as Racine to Corneille; and Jacques Saurin , whose evangelical sermons were delivered at the Hague. Caussin was sent into Brittany, and the judicious and learned Jesuit, Jacques Sirmond, who succeeded him, kept clear of politics. Of other writers who published works about the end of the 16th century, we may mention Jacques Peletier, or Jacobus Peletarius De occulta parte Numerorum, quam Algebram vocant, ; Petrus Ramus Arithmeticae Libri duo et totidem Algebrae, , and Christoph Clavius, who wrote on algebra in , though it was not published until Here Jacques Davy received his education, being taught Latin and mathematics by his father, and learning Greek and Hebrew and the philosophy then in vogue. Returning to Normandy he was presented to the king by Jacques of Matignon; after he had abjured Protestantism, being again presented by Philip Desportes, abbot of Tiron, as a young man without equal for knowledge and talent, he was appointed reader to the king.
