Time and Again is a illustrated novel by American writer Jack Finney. The many illustrations in the book are real, though, as explained in an endnote, not all are from the period in which the actions of the book take place.

Jack Finney is an author of science fiction and horror who was born in Milwaukee in 1914. His name was eventually changed to Walter Braden Finney. Graduating from Knox College in Illinois in 1936, Finney and Marguerite Guest were married not long after, bearing two children later on. Finney eventually moved to New York. He worked with an advertising company for a while before moving on in the 1940s to find his fortunes elsewhere. By the time he Jack grew ill and died, Jack Finney had made a name for himself in the entertainment arena. The book was notable for the impressively vivid pictures of life in New York that Jack Finney painted, earning the author further recognition. Of course, most people will always remember him for the *Body Snatchers* movie. That particular book put him on the map. Jack Finney's Time and Again () has been a long-time favorite among time-travel tales, and has remained in print since its first publication. It was also selected by David Pringle for his Modern Fantasy: The Best Novels.

Si is debriefed and carefully examined after each trip to the past, and as far as the project organizers can tell, his activities in the past are making no difference to the present. He is encouraged to go back again. He presents himself at 19 Gramercy Park as a potential boarder. He is accepted, begins living there and learns that the man who mailed the letter is named Jake Pickering. He goes on to learn that Pickering is blackmailing Carmody. But he has a rival—Pickering. Danziger insists that the project be stopped. When he is overruled, he resigns. He is accepted back at Gramercy Park cheerfully, with even the dour Pickering happy. It seems Pickering and Julia are now engaged. Si casting himself as a private detective tells Julia that Pickering is a blackmailer. After knocking him out, Carmody ties up Pickering and sets out to look for the papers. He realizes they are concealed amid many other files. He patiently thumbs through the files, while Si and Julia agonize as the hours pass. Finally, Carmody decides on a scheme—burn the files. Pickering tries to save the files, but burns himself badly in the process. It is a huge fire, and Si and Julia find themselves trapped. After watching the efforts to fight the fire, in which many die, the shaken couple returns to Gramercy Park. There is no sign of Pickering. Terribly burned and bandaged, Carmody accuses them of murdering Pickering and starting the fire. After they leave, Byrnes expresses indecision and lets them walk away—only to yell "The prisoners are escaping" to the sergeant who accompanies him. It is a set-up, the two are to prove their guilt by "attempting to escape". As it turns out, police all over the island have already been provided with their description and photographs. Time and Again is a fascinatingly unique book written by bestselling author, Jack Finney (to). Originally released in , it is a time travel / romance complete with photographs and drawings.

This novel of speculative fiction tells the story of a lonely, frustrated artist in New York City who journeys back and forth through time. It is in many ways written in the tradition of similar novels written by H. Wells and Jules Verne, using real-life science as a springboard for a narrative that explores the possibilities of what might happen if the principles behind that science were taken further. Within that context, the novel explores themes of personal responsibility and the relationship between past and present. At first Si is hesitant, but is soon convinced to give the project a try. Shortly after the tests are completed, Si is introduced to Danziger, the head of the project. He also tells Si he has more potential for successfully completing such a journey than any of the other potential candidates, and tells him what period in the past the scientists want him to visit. Si has other ideas, and explains his interest in visiting a moment at which a mysterious event in the family history of his girlfriend Katie occurred. The training process is soon complete, and Si makes a very brief journey into the past. Si makes the journey and observes the incident, tracking one of the participants to a particular boarding house and then returning to the present. Si once again completes the journey into the past, taking a room at the boarding house. While there, he falls in love with Julia Charbonneau, a young woman running the place. Conflict arises when Si discovers that Julia is involved with the emotionally volatile Jake Pickering, who also happens to be the suspicious character Si followed to the boarding house. They both, along with Julia and Carmody, are trapped in a deliberately set and quickly spreading fire. Si and Julia escape, both feeling guilt at having been at least partially responsible for the fire but both realizing there was nothing that could be done. A visit by the ruthless Chief of Police convinces them that there is a plot to make them criminally responsible, and they spend two very tense days on the run, ending only when Si makes the desperate choice to take Julia back to the present with him. Si spends a pleasant day educating the sometimes wonderstruck, sometimes fearful Julia about the 20th Century. At the end of the day, however, she announces her decision to return. When Si expresses concern that the police will still be after her, Julia reveals that she knows the truth of what happened in the fire, which leads Si to understand the truth behind the mysterious incident involving Carmody. Julia returns to the past and Si returns to the scientists at the project, explaining what happened and expressing his desire to leave the project. The scientists tell him they want him to go back one more time and change a crucial event in the past to improve the present. Si refuses, saying no one has the right to tamper with reality that way. They insist, he reconsiders, and arrangements are made for him to return. Si agrees, and when he returns to the past, he eliminates the possibility that the entire project could be started in the first place.
