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Abstract Background Patient portals ie, electronic personal health records tethered to institutional electronic health records are recognized as a promising mechanism to support greater patient engagement, yet questions remain about how health care leaders, policy makers, and designers can encourage adoption of patient portals and what factors might contribute to sustained utilization. **Objective** The purposes of this state of the science review are to 1 present the definition, background, and how current literature addresses the encouragement and support of patient engagement through the patient portal, and 2 provide a summary of future directions for patient portal research and development to meaningfully impact patient engagement. **Results** We found studies that met the inclusion criteria. Based on the research questions, explicit and implicit aims of the studies, and related measures addressed, the studies were grouped into five major topics patient adoption, provider endorsement, health literacy, usability, and utility. We discuss the findings and conclusions of studies that address the five topical areas. Future directions of research should focus on identifying specific populations and contextual considerations that would benefit most from a greater degree of patient engagement through a patient portal. While an electronic personal health record ePHR tethered to an electronic health record EHR , also known as a patient portal, is currently recognized as a promising mechanism to support greater patient engagement, questions remain about how health care leaders, policy makers, and designers can encourage adoption by both providers and patients and what factors might contribute to sustained utilization. In general, patient information from the EHR such as the problem list, allergies, and lab test results populate the patient portal. In some instances, patients may enter data to populate the EHR. In contrast, an untethered ePHR is under the control of the patient. This means an individual manually enters all information or grants permission for the information to be transferred to the ePHR, from a specific source like a laboratory or pharmacy, and determines who will have access. Because there is little that health care organizations can do to initiate patient engagement using an untethered ePHR, this literature review is focused exclusively on the patient portal, directly linked to an EHR. These initiatives also coincided with the broad social movement towards adoption and daily use of powerful information and communication sharing tools such as smartphones and social media, illustrating the readiness of the general population to embrace technology in a new socially interactive way. Features mandated by MU that directly relate to patient portal functionality include providing 1 a clinical summary to the patient after each visit, 2 secure messaging SM between patient and provider, 3 ability to view, download, and transmit personal health record data, 4 patient specific education, 5 patient reminders for preventative services, and 6 medication reconciliation [7]. While these criteria clearly outline tasks and goals, they do little to reflect the value proposition to the end users patients and providers or the steps required to engage patients in a sustained and relevant way. Therefore, an aim of this review was to explore the current research addressing the encouragement and support of patient engagement through the patient portal. **Methods** **Search Strategy** Due to the advances in technology and consumer readiness in the mids, the review was limited to recent literature to better reflect current trends in design, functionality, and perceived user readiness of patient portals. Bibliographies and the literature reviews from these sources were used to identify additional studies [8 , 9]. Initial inclusion criteria were 1 original, peer-reviewed, qualitative, and quantitative research of tethered ePHRs or patient portals, 2 English language, and 3 available in full text. Studies were not targeted to any particular patient subgroup, disease, or clinical setting. Of the articles identified by the search, were excluded based on title and abstract. Further review based on the final inclusion criterion resulted in articles, which were reviewed in depth see Multimedia Appendix 1 for summaries of each. Excluded articles focused on the provider perspective only, technicalities of patient portal implementation eg, policy issues, safety,

security , implications for Health Information Exchange, economics impacts, or the utility of patient portal data for research purposes see Figure 1.

The family is also said to be related to the Armstrongs of Kippure Park Wicklow but the connection, if there is one, has not been traced. The Irish seats of this family were mostly in Co. All their houses were fairly small, but the existence of several different branches of the family over a long period, and their notable tendency to produce sons, made them a force to be reckoned with in Offaly out of all proportion to their wealth and status. It is said that the family of Armstrong came originally from Mangerton in Liddesdale in the Scottish borders, and that the first of the family to move to Ireland was William Armstrong, who participated in the settlement of Ulster during the reign of King James VI and I. He was followed to Ireland by his nephew Andrew Armstrong c. The Armstrongs of Gallen Priory descended from the eldest son of his second marriage; the Armstrongs of Ballycumber from the second son of that marriage; and the Armstrongs of Garry Castle and Castle Iver from the younger son of his third marriage. The Armstrongs of Nancealverne descended from a cadet branch of the Armstrongs of Ballycumber in the 19th century. The longevity and vigour of some of the early generations of the family were remarkable: Andrew Armstrong himself died at the age of 95 and sired his youngest son, Archibald Armstrong, at the age of 79; and Archibald in turn lived to the age of There cannot be many families in which two generations span years! He was probably born in about , and was thus of the generation which was most closely involved in the fighting of the Civil War, being himself taken prisoner at the second Battle of Worcester in Many of his eight sons grew up against the backdrop of war and it is hardly surprising therefore that most of them became soldiers in turn, three reaching the rank of Colonel. It would appear that through his marriage he acquired the Gallen estate in Offaly, which had been vested in the Coghlanes since the dissolution of the monasteries. His son, Andrew Armstrong c. He became a barrister and stood as a candidate for Parliament on one occasion, albeit unsuccessfully. Two of his younger sons fought in the Peninsula Wars, where one died and the other distinguished himself so much that he was knighted on his return to Ireland, although he died shortly afterwards while a mature student at Cambridge. His youngest son, Charles Nesbitt Frederic Armstrong , was briefly the husband of the great Australian opera singer, Dame Nellie Melba, although they were separated in Charles and his father, incidentally, between them lived for years, which is a record almost to rival that of the first Andrew and his son Archibald. Sir Edmund Frederick Armstrong , 2nd bt. Leix for over twenty years, although he seems to have lived at Gallen after retiring in When the position of Anglo-Irish landowners deteriorated in the early 20th century, his son, Sir Andrew Harvey Armstrong , 3rd bt. His brother and heir was John Warneford Armstrong , who as a young army officer certainly held atheist, and may have held republican, opinions. In

due course he was cautiously approached by the Sheares brothers to join the United Irishmen ahead of the planned uprising, but he secretly reported all his conversations with them to his superior officers, and after they were arrested he was the chief and most damaging witness at their trial. Irish independence activists took a dim view of what they saw as his treachery, and held him responsible for the execution of the Sheares brothers, and for many years his life was so threatened in Ireland that he was obliged to live abroad. By the s, he had returned to Ballycumber, and he lived there until his death in , when the house passed to his younger daughter, Anne Frances and her husband, William Bigoe Buchanan. It seems to have been sold after her death. The eldest son of Warneford Armstrong and his third wife was John Armstrong He had a sickly younger son, William, who on the advice of his doctors was sent at the age of about eleven to live in Penzance Cornwall and indeed died there in It seems likely that it was while visiting William that his brother, Rev. John Armstrong first met his future wife, Mary Anne, the daughter of Col. John Scobell of Nancealverne, a villa on the edge of Penzance. Mary Anne, who survived until , inherited Nancealverne from her brother in , and the house remains the property of her descendants, having passed in turn to her son, John Scobell Armstrong , grandson, John Warneford Scobell Armstrong , who was a County Court judge in Plymouth and Cornwall, and great-grandson, John Hamilton Scobell Armstrong All of these later generations have displayed literary and academic tastes, and the last-named was a schoolmaster at Eton and a literary critic. The fourth branch of the family was the most complex. As we have seen, Archibald Armstrong was the youngest son of Andrew Armstrong c. In the family tradition, his sons pursued military careers and one of his grandsons was the Chief Royal Engineer, General John Armstrong , but over several generations various members of the family bought, married into, or inherited estates and small country houses. When he died his children were left as orphans, and the Court of Chancery directed that Castle Armstrong should continue to be let to provide an income for their support. Despite this provision, only one of the daughters survived to maturity, and she and her husband sold the estate in , albeit to a distant Armstrong relative. One of his younger sons, Edmund Armstrong was a courtier in London and bought Forty Hall at Enfield on the outskirts of the capital, but it was sold again after his death. Nonetheless, it was apparently not until the early 19th century that his heir, Thomas St. George Armstrong , built the house known as the Garden House at Garry Castle, which for the first time provided a country house on the Garry Castle estate. His first and third sons, Carteret Andrew Armstrong and William Bigoe Armstrong , seem to have lived at Garry Castle, perhaps each holding one of the two houses there. The second and fourth sons, Thomas St George Armstrong and John Priaulx Armstrong , were sent out to Argentina in to establish a merchant and banking house in Buenos Aires. John eventually returned, married one of his Priaulx cousins from Guernsey, and settled at Beachy House on that island. Thomas, however, remained in Argentina, where he displayed enormous commercial acumen and made a fortune from trading, banking, railway development and urban property. He remained a Protestant but married a Catholic, and partly as a result, found himself a trusted emissary between the British and Argentine governments over many years; something that the resulted in the offer which he rejected of a knighthood. He invested his wealth in Argentine estates, the greatest of which was the magnificent estancia Santo Tomas at Santa Fe. At his death he left large charitable bequests in Argentina, and divided his estates between his children. His youngest son, a third Thomas St. In , however, he bought the Garry Castle estate from his cousin, Carteret Andrew Armstrong , perhaps just to keep it in the family. The estate was presumably sold after his death which I have not been able to trace , as his only daughter was married to a French count on diplomatic service in Buenos Aires and had no personal links with Ireland at all. The fourth son of Andrew Armstrong ? None of the many Irish estates owned by the Armstrongs in the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries therefore now remains in family hands, and their English property, Nancealverne, is now let as holiday accommodation and is not currently occupied by the family. Mount Armstrong, Kildare A small gentry house, now known as Mount Windsor, appears to have been built or remodelled in the early 18th century for Lt-Col. This is a mid to late 18th century house with a five bay entrance front that has a centrepiece of a tripartite pedimented doorway with a triple window above. 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During his childhood the country was ruled by regents , first by his mother, until she remarried the following year, and then by John Stewart, 2nd Duke of Albany , next in line to the Crown after James and his younger brother, Alexander Stewart, Duke of Ross , who died in infancy. When he went to the park below the Castle, "by secret and in right fair and soft wedder weather ," six horsemen would scour the countryside two miles roundabout for intruders. To princes als it is ane vyce, To ryd or run over rakleslie, Or aventure to go on yce, Accordis nocht to thy majestie. Several new court servants were appointed including a trumpeter, Henry Rudeman. Another attempt later that year, on 4 September at the battle of Linlithgow Bridge , failed again to relieve the King from the clutches of Angus. When James and his mother came to Edinburgh on 20 November , she stayed in the chambers at Holyroodhouse, which Albany had used, James using the rooms above. He then subdued the Border rebels and the chiefs of the Western Isles. As well as taking advice from his nobility and using the services of the Duke of Albany in France and at Rome, James had a team of professional lawyers and diplomats, including Adam Otterburn and Thomas Erskine of Haltoun. Even his pursemaster and yeoman of the wardrobe, John Tennent of Listonschiels, was sent on an errand to England, though he got a frosty reception. He also gave his illegitimate sons lucrative benefices, diverting substantial church wealth into his coffers. James spent a large amount of his wealth on building work at Stirling Castle , Falkland Palace , Linlithgow Palace and Holyrood , and he built up a collection of tapestries from those inherited from his father. In he sailed to Kirkwall in Orkney , then Lewis , in his ship the Salamander , first making a will in Leith , knowing this to be "uncertane aventuris. James V did not tolerate heresy , and during his reign a number of outspoken Protestants were persecuted. The most famous of these was Patrick Hamilton , who was burned at the stake as a heretic at St Andrews in Later in the reign, the English ambassador Ralph Sadler tried to encourage James to close the monasteries and take their revenue so that he would not have to keep sheep like a mean subject. The lack of commitment to this meeting was regarded by English observers as a sign that Scotland was firmly allied to France and Catholicism, particularly by the influence of Cardinal Beaton , Keeper of the Privy Seal, and as a cause for war. Yet the daughters of Francis I of France were promised elsewhere or sickly. She would have a dowry as if she were a French Princess. James decided to visit France in person.
