This happened too often to be something that many would class as coincidence. Here are a few experiences from other people. The first is by Gloria Hunniford, a well known television and radio presenter in the UK, she lost her daughter, Caron, to cancer and this is what she said: After the funeral when my cousin was leaving she said to look out for a white feather. I had never heard of this before. Anyway, today, nearly two weeks since my Mum passed away I looked out the window and everywhere was icy. I went to get in my car and at my feet was a beautiful white feather. God Bless You Sweetheart x" Anon. I have been devastated ever since but have seen several white feathers. I like to think it is his way of telling me he is okay. I have put one in the diary I am now keeping. I do believe in angels and that one day I will see my husband again. May "My sister passed away very suddenly aged 17, a few years ago. I had never seen a white feather in our house ever before, but they began appearing every single day for the first couple of weeks after she passed away. When it was time for me to leave my home a few weeks later, to go back to college, I found a gigantic white feather on my bag, and one stuck to the car door! When things were most difficult, white feathers would appear. They then began appearing in my college dorm when I returned, something which never happened before. As time went on, they became less common. Then, about a year later, on the morning of my graduation, a huge feather floated down towards me. I definitely take it as her way of letting us know she is ok. I really hope this is a sign. My father died unexpectedly last month and my mum and I were devastated. At his funeral there was a beautiful white feather on the church pew where we sat. Mum and I looked at each other and actually smiled at each other through our tears. I even found one in a drawer by my bedside. They always make me smile.

John Whitefeather is a hero who lingers in your mind long after you've finished reading Whitefeather's Woman. Using the perfect balance of strength and vulnerability, Deborah Hale has created John Whitefeather, a man who has his own secrets and prejudices, yet finds room in his heart for shy, embattled Jane Harris.

Pure-breed gamecocks do not show white feathers, so its presence indicates that the cockerel is an inferior cross-breed. The organization aimed to shame men into enlisting in the British army by persuading women to present them with a white feather if they were not wearing a uniform. They, in addition to handing out the feathers, also lobbied to institute an involuntary universal draft, which included those who lacked votes due to being too young or not owning property. Although the draft would conscript both sexes, only males would be on the front lines. In Britain it started to cause problems for the government when public servants and men in essential occupations came under pressure to enlist. This prompted the Home Secretary, Reginald McKenna, to issue employees in state industries with lapel badges reading "King and Country" to indicate that they too were serving the war effort. Likewise, the Silver War Badge, given to service personnel who had been honourably discharged due to wounds or sickness, was first issued in September to prevent veterans from being challenged for not wearing uniform. Anecdotes from the period indicates that the campaign was not popular amongst soldiers - not least because soldiers who were home on leave could find themselves presented with the feathers. He was riding a tram when he was presented with a white feather by a girl sitting behind him. He smacked her across the face with his pay book saying: A woman who confronted a young man in a London park demanded to know why he was not in the army. He received a white feather anyway. Samson had been awarded the Victoria Cross for gallantry in the Gallipoli campaign. This prompted him to enlist, and he subsequently received the Distinguished Service Order for bravery. He argued that these "idiotic young women were using white feathers to get rid of boyfriends of whom they were tired". The pacifist Fenner Brockway claimed that he received so many white feathers he had enough to make a fan. The white feather campaign was briefly renewed during World War II. They are still worn by the iwi associated with that area, and by Te Ati Awa in Wellington. They are known as te raukura, which literally means the red feather, but metaphorically, the chiefly feather. They are usually three in number, interpreted as standing for "glory to God, peace on earth, goodwill toward people" Luke 2: Albatross feathers are preferred but any white feathers will do. They are usually worn in the hair or on the lapel but not from the ear. Some time after the war, pacifists found an alternative interpretation of the white feather as a symbol of peace. The apocryphal story goes that in , Quakers in a Friends meeting house in Easton, New York were faced by a tribe of Indians on the war path. Rather than flee, the Quakers fell silent and waited. The Indian chief came into the meeting house and finding no weapons he declared the Quakers as friends. On leaving he took a white feather from his quiver and attached it to the door as a sign to leave the building unharmed. In the Peace Pledge Union sold white feather badges as symbols of peace. Other symbolism[edit] In the United States, the white feather has also become a symbol of courage, persistence and superior combat marksmanship. Hathcock picked up a white feather on a mission and wore it in his hat to taunt the enemy. He was so feared by enemy troops that they put a price on his head. Its wear on combat headgear flaunts an insultingly easy target for enemy snipers. Mason tells the story of Harry Faversham, an officer in the British Army, who decides to resign his commission the day before his regiment is dispatched to fight in Sudan the First War of Sudan, leading to the fall of Khartoum. Stung by the criticism, Harry sails to Sudan, disguises himself as an Arab, and looks for the opportunity to redeem his honour. He manages this by fighting a covert war on behalf of the British, saving the life of one of his colleagues in the process. On returning to England he asks each of his accusers to take back one of the feathers. Wodehouse novel *The White Feather* is a school story about apparent cowardice and the efforts a boy goes to in order to redeem himself by physical combat. The title character is a British secret agent who is falsely perceived to be a coward for his refusal to enlist as a soldier. he attempts to enlist, and is unjustly accused of cowardice. In , new wave band Kajagoogoo released their debut album called White Feathers , whose opener was the title track, a light-hearted allegory for weak people, whereas the final track, Frayo, had a political flavour, referencing cowardice as the cause for an unchanging war-torn world. In , progressive rock band Marillion released an anti-war song called White Feather as the ending track to their album Misplaced Childhood. Film and television[edit] The novel The Four Feathers has been the basis of at least seven feature films, the most recent being The Four Feathers , starring Heath Ledger. In the short-lived British period drama Lilies , the brother of the protagonists is discharged from the military during World War I after his boat sinks and he is one of a handful of shell shocked survivors. Billy gets sent and given numerous white feathers for his perceived cowardice, and begins to hallucinate them choking him. This is a recurring theme throughout the series.

He is censured for cowardice by three of his comrades, Captain Trench as well as Lieutenants Castleton and Willoughby, which is signified by their delivery of three white feathers to him. His best friend in the regiment, Captain Durrance, becomes a rival for Ethne. Harry talks with Lieutenant Sutch, a friend of his late father, who is an imposing retired general. He questions his own motives, but says he will redeem himself by acts that will convince his critics to take back the feathers. Most of the action over the next six years takes place in the eastern Sudan, where the British and Egyptians held Suakin. Durrance is blinded by sunstroke and invalided. Castleton is reportedly killed at Tamai, where a British square is briefly broken by a Mahdi attack. He is aided by a Sudanese Arab, Abou Fatma. Later, disguised as a mad Greek musician, Harry gets imprisoned in Omdurman, where he rescues Captain Trench, who had been captured on a reconnaissance mission. Learning of his actions, Willoughby and Trench give Ethne the feathers they had taken back from Harry. He returns to England, and sees Ethne for what he thinks is one last time, as she has decided to devote herself to the blind Durrance. But Durrance tells her his blindness is incurable and frees her for Harry. Ethne and Harry wed, and Durrance travels to "the East" as a civilian. The story is rich in characters and subplots, which the filmed versions trim. Some versions have made major changes in the story line. The best-known version is set at the time of the campaign and battle of Omdurman, but this is a future event only hinted at in the novel. For example, the celebrated cinematic version, produced by Alexander Korda and Ralph Richardson, begins just after the death of Gordon in Khartoum. Most of its action takes place over a three-year period between 1884 and 1885, climaxing with the Battle of Omdurman. In the silent version, a square of Highlanders is broken, but saved by Feversham and the Egyptian garrison of a besieged fort. Set in the 1880s, its great moment comes when wild hippos in a river attack the Dervishes pursuing Feversham. The films each feature a British square broken in a dramatic battle sequence. This is only mentioned in the novel, in a battle in which the square recovered. The various film versions differ in the precise historical context. The version starring Heath Ledger is set during the 1885 campaign. The British infantry square was broken in the battle of Abu Klea, but the British managed to win the battle. Critics complained that the film did not explore the characters sufficiently, and had historical inaccuracies in uniform dress. The central battle is more accurately treated in the film *Khartoum*. The enemy forces, Islamic rebels called Dervishes, of The Mahdi, are the same, as are the geographic settings of Britain, Egypt and the Sudan. The various film versions are as follows:
