Tony Guthrie Leave a comment Sermon Outlining and Genre Differing biblical genre types of biblical literature will need to be investigated differently as it relates to sermon outlining for preaching purposes. An example of this approach based upon Philippians 4: The value of this approach is that, once mastered, the preacher easily can see the natural divisions and movements of the text. As he separates dominant from subordinate statements the natural outline is revealed. This approach takes some practice but once the preacher is comfortable with it his preparation time can be greatly reduced. Narrative literature typically is not approached as syntactically as epistolary or poetic literature and its teaching are generally indirect. Although several approaches to narrative can be taken, an easy and useful way is simply to look for the natural movements of the story. Movement 1 – no homiletical significance 1 Jesus went out from there and came into His hometown; and His disciples followed Him. Are not His sisters here with us? Movement 5- The disconcerting remembrance of unbelief 6 And He wondered at their unbelief. And He was going around the villages teaching. The movements are labeled in such a way that the preacher can translate them into a workable life-application outline once the exegetical work is concluded. If the preacher uses plural outline unifiers, transitional sentences, and life-application outlines; he can ensure that his message will remain unified and on track. These types occur proportionately in that order. Poetry – Carson spoke of wisdom literature. As preachers, we must allow Biblical genres to speak and even form our sermons.

A topical sermon is one way to teach the Bible to your congregation. There are many subjects in the Bible which you can use to create topical sermons. For example, you may want to teach on the subject of sin, temptation, forgiveness, end times, creation, giving, heaven and hell. Here are four fundamental truths that I keep in mind when I write a topical sermon! By the way, there are generally three classifications for sermons – topical sermons, texture sermons and expository sermons. James gives an in depth description of each classification with examples of how they are structured and presented. Let me explain them in the following article. For example, you may want to teach about heaven. Each sermon needs an angle, a topic universal enough to concern most listeners and particular enough to spark curiosity. The angle you create tells us what the topical sermon is about. The angle tells us what the sermon is about. The purpose tells us what the sermon should do or what the listeners will do as a result of the topical sermon. If you are going to teach on the Eternal Wonders of Heaven, what do you want your listeners to do? They spend a chapter explaining the importance of angle and purpose. Create a Topical Sermon Outline I never write a sermon without first creating a sermon outline. The sermon outline is the road map for the message. When I write a sermon outline, I keep three structural features in mind. The Main Preaching Point The main preaching point defines your message – it expresses what you are going to preach about. The Key Word or Hinge Word The key word or hinge word allows you to expand and explain your main preaching point. For example, you are preaching on the subject of The Eternal Wonders of Heaven. You can use Wonders as your key word in order to swing to the sub-points from your main preaching point. For example, today I want to look at the four eternal wonders of heaven. The first eternal wonder of heaven is that heaven is a real place. The second wonder of heaven is that heaven is a beautiful place. The third wonder of heaven is that heaven is a populated place and the fourth wonder of heaven is that heaven is a personal place. The key word or hinge word must be a plural noun. Charles Koller fully explains this homiletical device in the seventh chapter. The Sub-points and Incidental Points Once you have created your main preaching point and key word, you can add your sub-points and incidental points. It is important to remember that your sub-points and incidental points are simply expanding and explaining your main preaching point. Below is an example of how to write a topical sermon! Here is an outline of my sermon on the Eternal Wonders of Heaven. There are three eternal wonders of heaven. Heaven is a real place Rev. Here is another outline of my sermon on why we worship a gracious God? Create and Write the Topical Sermon Once I have completed the sermon outline, I add content with illustrations and application to the sermon outline – how to write a topical sermon. Once I complete adding content with illustrations and application, I write the introduction and conclusion to the sermon. I always write the introduction and conclusion after I have completed the body of the sermon which is the sermon outline. I have been writing sermons for about twenty-five years 25 and I have found the following books invaluable to my education on writing sermons. ### 6: How To Write A 3 Point Sermon | Sermons That Work

*Too many preachers are guilty of preaching a history lesson instead of a sermon. Though well-intended, sermons preached by communicators committed to exposing the Bible's teachings may develop and then deliver an exegetical outline instead of a homiletical one, thus leaving the text's meaning vague and its application to guesswork.*

The 3 point sermon is not about garnering information for the sermon, it is about packaging that information for delivery. How To Write a 3 Point Sermon I have been writing weekly sermons for about thirty years and I have found the structure of the three point sermon to be one of the best ways to package biblical truth for delivery. The benefits of the structure of the three point sermon are: The three point sermon expands and explains one topic The three point sermon is easy to follow The three point sermon has a natural, sequential flow The key to writing any sermon especially a 3 point sermon is the structure of the sermon. Once you understand the structure of packaging a sermon for delivery, you will find writing 3 point sermons quite easy. The Sermon I teach homiletics to Bible College students and I make it very clear to them that a sermon has three parts – the introduction, the body or sermon outline and the conclusion. I know this is obvious but many students begin to write their sermons without framing the body of their sermon sermon outline for delivery. The body of the sermon is the bulk of your message. The introduction simply introduces the main preaching point of your sermon, which is the body of your sermon. The conclusion concludes your sermon by reinforcing the main preaching point of your sermon with application and action. Therefore, you need to start with the body of your sermon and the body of your 3 point sermon is the sermon outline. The Main Preaching Point Every sermon must have a main preaching point. You cannot develop a 3 point sermon without a main preaching point. In Luke chapter 4: The story is about Jesus being tempted by Satan. This story helps us understand how to deal with temptation. The Sub-points Now that I have got the main preaching point, I simply need to expand and explain the main preaching points with sub-points in this case 3 sub-points. I usually expand and explain the main preaching point by asking why, what, where, when or how of the main preaching point. In this case, I asked the how question. How can we deal with temptation with a winning smile? After much study of this text of Scripture, I came up with three sub-points. There are three WAYS to deal with temptation with a winning simile. This three point sermon outline becomes the road map for your sermon. Your congregation know exactly what you are going to preach on: Three ways to deal with temptation with a winning smile. Your congregation know exactly what you are going to say about your main preaching point: We must recognize temptation immediately. We must realize the way of escape and we must remember the subtleties of temptation. Your three point sermon is easy to follow because it has a natural progression and flow to it. The Incidental Points Sometimes it is advantageous to expand and explain your sub-points. In this three point sermon outline, I added two incidental points to the second and third sub-points. Here is the completed 3 point sermon outline of Luke chapter 4: There are three WAYS to deal with temptation with a winning smile. We must recognize temptation immediately We must realize the way of escape Jesus trusted God We must remember the subtleties of temptation To draw us away from God To rely on our own resources Conclusion: The Sermon Manuscript A. Manuscript Content Once you have crafted your 3 point sermon outline, you will need to write content to the sermon outline with appropriate illustrations and applications. Once you have written the content and added appropriate illustrations and applications, you will need to write the introduction and the conclusion to the sermon. I always remind myself that a sermon is like an airplane flight. The take-off is the introduction, the flight is the body of the sermon and the landing is the conclusion. Manuscript Markup I usually write a full manuscript. This is so that I have a physical and electronic record of the sermon. However, the manuscript is not the same as an assignment paper. I format the sermon manuscript in point form so that I can mark up the manuscript as a road map for my preaching. I only write content to the sermon outline, introduction and conclusion in short form so when I preach, I simply expand what I want to say in my own words. I do not preach word for word from the sermon manuscript. I would encourage you to write your manuscript in short form and I would encourage you to develop the confidence to share the content of your sermon in your own words. This may take some time to develop your confidence and the freedom to

Speak your sermon content in your own words. I guarantee that your preaching will grow in leaps and bounds by doing this. Manuscript Practice When I write a three point sermon as described above, I find that I know the sermon manuscript intimately. I know the main preaching point with its sub-points and incidental points. In some ways, I could quite easily preach the sermon without the manuscript. However, I always take my sermon manuscript with me into the pulpit because the sermon manuscript keeps me on track when I move through the sermon. Nevertheless, I do practice the sermon manuscript before I preach it. In other words, I simply talk my way through the sermon manuscript so that I understand the transitions from one point to another, the content and the illustrations and applications. I do not want to be self-guessing myself when I am preaching. It takes me about one hour to talk my way through the manuscript. Also, this helps me with any last minute ideas and changes to the sermon manuscript. By practicing the sermon manuscript, I give the Holy Spirit every opportunity to guide and shape my preaching. Sometimes the Holy Spirit leads me to add content to the sermon as I am preaching and other times the Holy Spirit encourages me to subtract content from the sermon manuscript.
